

Legal action stalls

A Burlington businessman Peter G. Lush, Halton region's current landlord, is taking the region to court to block the proposed new regional headquarters in Oakville.

Lush failed for an injunction against the bylaw authorizing construction of the \$2.7 million building.

The ministry of housing, which administers the parkway belt regulations, has yet to advertise an exemption for the proposal. A delay of at least two weeks is expected, which could conflict with a contractual deadline of July 21.

This situation leaves the headquarters without a building permit and the possibility exists that the contract could be declared invalid. The architects would then be required to submit a new design.

The additional \$500,000 needed to build a full-scale headquarters would come from the regional mill rate. The region signed a three-year lease with Lush Associates in 1974. The move came after a decision to sell the Halton County Administration building to the province.

Second farm home approved

Planning board's attempt to get public input on its decision to allow the building of a second residence to house hired help on a farm passed in loud silence last week.

Only one farmer showed up prepared to address the board and chairman Roy Booth silenced him with the comment that his remarks should be made to the regional land division committee rather than planning board.

Keith Leslie of R.R.4 Georgetown told the board that he felt farmers should be allowed to separate up to two lots per hundred acres from their farm and pointed out that farmers would not build unless they could get a separation for the land on which the second house stands.

Mr. Leslie believes farmers should be allowed to sell poor land and invest the capital in stock, machinery, or buildings and thus upgrade their farms.

The board is seeking public opinion concerning the building of two residences on one lot. Booth pointed out, and since no one is prepared to comment on that subject the amendment is approved.

One council approves the amendment, it will be forwarded to the ministry of housing for provincial approval.

Sheridan offers summer courses
