Low water danger for boats, canoes

DANGER exists due to low water levels in some areas.

Canoeists should take note that the rapids they took last year may not be there this year, only the bare rocks and too little water for navigation. There is also increased risk of running an outboard on the rocks and ruining a motor, so take along extra shear pins and an eagle eye.

Fairy Lake in Acton has a good level of water which helped me take a nice brace of Largemouth Bass last weekend, and there is a lot more where they came from. Fishermen probably see more turtles than anyone else. Have you noticed the difference in them?

A book written by Barbara Froom will be a great help to you as you try to identify them, and add pressure to your outdoor activities. The Turtles of Canada is printed by the Jefferson Press and is available from good book stores.

The ministry of natural resources is inviting public response on the master plan for Lake Superior Provincial Park. This park was formed 33 years ago and covers 601 square miles. If there is the chance that you will use this park even once, it is worth your comment.

Sport hunting of moose will be limited to the central and northern areas of the park east of Highway 17. Grouse and snowshoe hare will also be allowed in the same area. To see him fashion a gun from raw materials would take too long, but weapons in various stages of completion can be seen and I feel that it is a worthwhile visit. BASS FISHING...I feel there is no finer way of taking bass than on top. Of the water that is. The Heddon TINT TORPEDO and DYING FLUTTER are the finest of lures for this purpose. I know DAVE HOBBS can vouch for that. These are both "propeller" type lures with propeller blades in front and rear on the Dying Flutter and a single blade on the Tiny Torpedo. These lures are cast to "structure" and left to settle. They are then twitched to activate the blades and allowed to settle again.

Bass fully intend to KILL these tiny creatures that are stupid enough to cross their feed path and the resultant strike will jar your rod arm. If they don't work for you, then read the instruction packed with each lure and try again. They are a sure fire bass lure, and I swear by them, as part of my "Repertoire" of fishing facts. I can't stand it any longer. I am going to wind this column up and go fishing in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
