It they don't work for you, then read the instruction packed with each lure and try again. They are a sure fire bass lure, and I swear by them as part of my "Repertoire" of fishing facts. I can't stand it any longer. I am going to wind this column up and go fishing in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
