The most difficult task a leader must acquire is the ability to understand why a child is "acting out" and how to react to the situation.

Children of different age groups have different personalities, such as a child from age five to seven may have a short attention span, want be the centre of attention, and will generally command a great deal of attention. Whereas, a child of seven to 10 may have a strong identity for his own sex and age group, may need close friends, have a willingness to share, and be less geared towards being the centre of attention.

This general classification of children raised a few questions and arguments among the L.I.T. group, Jennifer said, because they compared these descriptions to their own brothers and sisters personalities in that age category. After discussing the different characteristics with the age group she then classified the ideal reactions of a leader. enabling the leader to cope with a child's attitude.

· Jennifer is excited about the program and is looking forward to the group's practical experience because that's when she can tell how much of the two-weeking training the leaders have learned.

Constable Raj Swaminathan, district I safety branch of Halton Regional Police, advised works committee an adult crossing guard should be positioned on Guelph
