### Mercury: Danger?

 LOOK at it this way; if you avoided everything that held a connotation of danger to your health, what would be left.

Mercury levels in fish may be harmful, but if you only eat it occasionally, relax. Still hardly a week goes by that someone doesn't ask me about Mercury, even though I have written about it many times in this column.

For the amount of fish you would eat as a sports fisherman, as I said, relax, I eat the fish I catch. Now eight Muskoka lakes have been identified as having mercury levels unacceptable for the consumption of fish.

I guess this is little consolation to the fact that pollution levels in Lake Simcoe are dropping and the lake is improving.

In accordance with the "BEDS OF NAVIGABLE WATERS ACT" any land below the "HIGH WATER" mark is the property of the Crown, unless otherwise expressed in the original patent or deed of the adjacent shore property. I hope that this will answer some of the questions that come in regarding whether you can negotiate a river or stream.

If a pilot project banning non-returnable or more properly, non-recyclable containers in the Interior of Quebec Provincial Park this summer is successful, the experiment will be extended to Algonquin Provincial Park next year, stated Natural Resources Minister Frank S. Miller. Introduction of the ban in Algonquin would reduce garbage accumulation by over 123,000 pounds a year. This would mean a savings of \$85,000.

The ban would only apply to the interior camping areas where no garbage collection services are provided. The trash is flown out by ministry aircraft and it cost about \$100 a ton. See what I mean?? Every time you throw something out, you pay for it twice.

PLACES TO GO, STONY LAKE Highway 7 to Peterborough, North on Highway 28. Muskie and Walleye are both plentiful in Stony, but at this time of the year the prime fish is bass, both Largemouth and Smallmouth.

FROGS, are the number one bait and top water lures are excellent. When you are in the area, there are a great many places to fish in Clear Lake to which it connects.

And here is a great way to catch frogs for bait. Take along a fly swatter and swat him one on the nose. It will stun him enough to get him in the bait box. Try it if you don't believe it. It's just one more secret from ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
