ONTARIO OUTDOORS Catching sassy bass

MECCA! St. Ola is mecca to bass fishermen, and in case you don't know where St. Ola is situated, follow the BASS HIGHWAY. Yes, I believe Highway 7 should be called Bass Highway, due to the many excellent spots for bass fishing. And by taking Highway 62 north you increase your bass catching chances tremendously.

St. Ola is one of the most important villages in the area being located on LIMERICK LAKE. This has got to be the number one largemouth bass lake in Ontario, and smallmouth are also present in good numbers.

We had made plans to fish Limerick Lake this year, but I guess those plans have fallen through, so I will plan to fish it next year. But, if you can make it over there I know that it may well be the best bass fishing trip you have or will ever make. The map that accompanies this column is of Limerick Lake and some of the "hot spots" are noted. Finer details can be had by obtaining Topographical Map 31C-13 Coe Hill and by buying yourself one of those fine "flahing maps" put out by the ministry of natural resources at the price of \$1 plus sales tax, Just write to the ministry at Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Ontario M?A 1W3 and ask for fishing map for Limerick Lake, Region Algonquin, District Bancroft.

Almost any bay where reeds, rocks or stumps are present will produce "lunker" bass. A fat chub minnow takes about 80 per cent of the fish and regardless of what type lure you use, I would suggest that it has weedless hooks, even when fishing minnows, due to the many weeds and stumps, and any good bass man knows this is where old "bucketmouth" hides himself.

And then there is "the Rockpile". This is a pile of huge rocks reaching up to about twelve feet from the surface and the surrounding depth is 90 feet giving some of the best STRUCTURE to be found anywhere.

The rockpile is about 150 feet off shore from a small cabin just west of the point of the bay where Beaver Creck flows into St. Ola Lake.

The Smallmouth Bass there want to have you thinking they are Largemouth they are so fat and sassy. You say you want to give Limerick a try?? Good, let me know and I will take a few days off the real estate business and go with you.

Book Review. For those of you who still like to fish Trout, even in the summer heat and low water conditions. take time out to read FLY FISH THE TROUT LAKES by Jack Shaw. This book, published by Mitchell Press has an excellent chapter called Summer Doldrums that should help you in your quest for the summer trout. In fact the whole book should increase the trouters chances of con-

necting with his quarry: Fly Fish the Trout Lakes is well illustrated with sketches and the section on the fly patterns in color is truly great. For trout fishing anytime take a look at the book. I know it will up your odds against the much sought after


