Plebiscite possible UPTO on library issue.

Georgetown residents may find themselves voting on just what library facilities they want if council upholds Mike Armstrong's motion for a plebiscite to decide the library

Coun. Armstrong says he intends to go ahead with his notice of motion announced at council last week because the Ontario Municipal Board decision last Wednesday called for a hearing into the proposed library site.

A plebiscite would be expen-sive he admits, but so is a

"It's going to cost so much for legal fees to defend the Cedarvale site at a hearing and then some residents wan't be satisfied," he points out.

If the plebiscite is held Armstrong would like to see three alternatives on it; - expansion of the present library facilities on Church Street; - the construction of a new library at another site; - or council take no action other than approved maintenance and upkeep of the existing site.


