Great results at Horse show

The Hornby Horse Show took place over the weekend at Sam-Son Farms in Hornby and Georgetown's Betsy Kurylowicz was quite pleased with her results, and she should be Betsy, riding her horse Robbie Burns, placed sixth in the Junior Working Hunter division and eleventh in the Hornby Hunter Classic.

With 76 horses competing in the Classic, the three judges narrowed the field down to thirteen finalists. Betsy being one of them. "There were horses from all over Canada and the United States and I was really pleased with my performances," says Betsy. Another pleased rider from Georgetown was Meagan Mills, who aboard Picturesque, placed fifth overall in the Hornby Hunter Classic. A busy young rider from Cheltenham, Sue MacNamara rode five different horses, four of which she owns with some excellent results.

Winning a first, 2 thirds and 1 fourth in the Amateur Owner division, Sue and her horse Mia walked away with the Reserved Champion Award. That is, the second best horse overall in the Amateur Owner division. Riding Perculator, Sue also won a seventh in the Preliminary Jumper class and a fourth and fifth in the Intermediate Jumper field. Andagan, this time on Flying Trapeze, Sue won 11th and

sixth place standings for the Preliminary Jumpers. Hugh Graham of Hillcrest Farm in Limehouse competed also with some fine results. Riding Dr. Spigal, Graham won first place in the Open Working Hunter division. Aboard Conventry Lad, Graham was happy with his second, third and fifth place standings in the Green Working Hunter class. Graham also rode some horses in the Jumpers class, but did not fare quite as well.

LONDON Ont.—Clive Llewellyn, of Georgetown, has been named to represent Canada in freestyle wrestling at the World Student Games in Bulgaria this month. Llewellyn is one of four Canadian Olympians named to the 10-member team. Other members of the 1976 Canadian Olympic Wrestling team taking part in the 40 country meet in Sofia are Egon Beiler in the 62 kilo (136½ pound) class; Michael Barry in the 57 kilo (125½ pound) class; and Richard Deschatelets in the 62 kilo (136½ pound) class.

Prior to leaving for the Bulgarian meet, Llewellyn will take part in the 68 kilo (150½) class in a dual meet with an all-star team from New Jersey and Pennsylvania Aug. 6 at the University of Western Ontario here. Beiler and Llewellyn both train at Lakehead University at Thunder Bay. The free-style wrestling team will be coached by Glynn Leysdon.
