

## Record enrollment

Approximately 4,131 full-time students are expected to enrol at Sheridan College in September. This represents a two to three per cent increase over last year, according to Registrar Elizabeth Craig.

She reports that the college has processed 6,788 applications as of July 30 compared to 6,365 at the same time last year. Out of the total number of applications, 2,736 are confirmations (new students who have paid the \$50 non-refundable deposit to reserve a place in the program.)

Of the 4,131 students, 2,533 are expected to enrol at the Oakville Campus, 1,157 at the Brampton Campus, 208 at the Credit Valley Campus, 168 at the Lorne Park Campus School of Crafts and Design and another 65 at the Milton Campus Heavy Equipment School.

"Enrollment statistics show that business programs at both the Oakville and Brampton Campuses are the most popular this year with a 37 per cent

increase in student confirmations at Brampton and a 12 per cent increase at Oakville," said Craig.

Some of the very competitive programs such as travel counselling, animal care, heavy equipment construction techniques, illustration and graphic design were filled by Feb. 15, the date Sheridan guarantees equal consideration for all applicants.

Since then, several other programs have reached full capacity, however, openings still exist in most of the college schools and divisions.

The 1,157 student enrolment expected at the Brampton Campus is a 23 per cent increase over last year. This increase is based on the popularity of the business programs, together with transfer of programs from the Oakville Campus and new program offerings.

Registration for all full-time day programs to take place September 6 to 9. Classes start September 12.

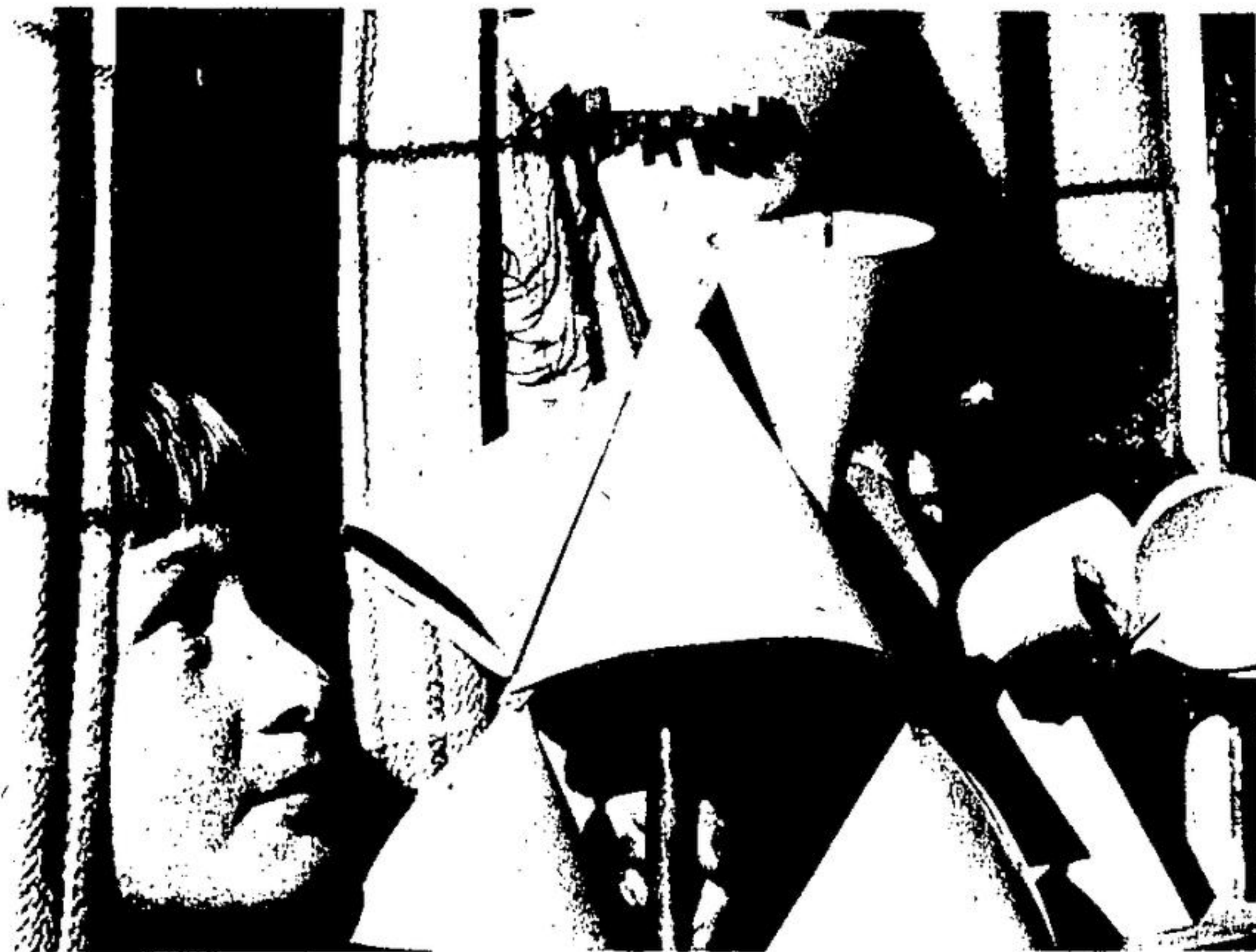
## Fewer accidents on Hwy. 401

The widening of a six-mile stretch, costing \$10 million, of the Highway 401 bypass south of the Toronto International Airport resulted in a 66 per cent decrease in traffic accidents, minister of transportation and communications, James Snow has announced.

In 1975 the accident toll on

the previous four-lane section extending between Highway 10 and Renforth Drive was 59.

Through 1975, there were 294 rear-end collisions compared to 59 in 1976, a decline of 79 per cent. While side-swipe accidents resulting from lane-changing were down (49 as against 97 in 1975) the decrease was not as dramatic.

In what has been called the "best of the Bonds" the latest James Bond movie, *The Spy Who Loved Me*, promises a good way to escape reality. Travelling into the world of adventure, this movie creates a great setting for the young and old to see themselves in the 'spy world.'

Agent 007 (Roger Moore) teams up with Soviet spy Andy Amosov (Barbara Bach) in trying to destroy the evil world of Stromberg, (Curt Jurgens) an eccentric ego maniac, who plots to destroy the world as we know it. Stromberg plans to create a new exciting world beneath the sea.

Stromberg's dastardly henchman, Jaws, (Richard Kiel) poses a big threat to Bond's success, as he tears through his victims with his shark-like, steel-capped teeth. At one point in the movie, Jaws actually kills a shark. This certainly is a sight to see.

With the latest spy glamor, Bond and his sexy counterpart, travel through Europe, the Middle East and the ocean's depths in their attempts to save the world.

It is highly unusual to see such a one-sided Grandmaster match as Korchnoi-Polugaevsky. The Soviet defector now living in Holland won the first 3 games of the match! Spassky-Portisch is proceeding more normally. The winners will be the first players to reach 8½ points.

The Simcoe Day Open drew 32 participants to the Toronto Central Chess Club. First place was taken by the pre-tournament favorite, Bryon Nickoloff of Toronto, who was the only Master in attendance. He scored 5½ out of 6. The 1½ point he conceded is given here:

EVERETT BIGGS of Brampton announced today that he has accepted a partnership with RALPH HEDLIN ASSOCIATES, economic and resource policy consultants.

Mr. Biggs recently resigned his position as Deputy Minister of the Ontario Ministry of the Environment, a position he had held for five years, following ten years as Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Food.
