Half of crimes solved

The clearance solve rate for July is 49 per cent for Area 1, Supt. Floyd Schwantz of Halton Regional Police said on Friday.

The total clearance rate since January is 50 per cent, he said.

At a police commission meeting Thursday in Oakville, Chief Ken Skerritt said he expected amendments in October for the Juvenile Delinquent Act, pushing the age of juveniles to 18 years of age, from 16 years.

"That is one way to bring the crime statistics down," Chief Skerritt said.

Supt. Schwantz said the amendments have been in the works for seven years, and "I'll believe it when I see it."

Supt. Schwantz said shoplifting is down in Halton Hills for July with theft cases over \$200 "about normal." There were 96 cases of theft under \$200 reported.

A total of 417 criminal cases were reported in July, he said and 207 of those cases are solved with 124 charges laid. The remaining 73 cases were cleared "in other ways," he said.

Supt. Schwantz said the crime rates represent "nothing out of the ordinary." In Halton for July, 340 male adults were charged and 29 female adults were charged. Twenty-two male juveniles were charged and one female juvenile charged.

Spectacular garage blaze

Firefighters were worried that a 250 gallon storage tank would catch fire in a burning garage owned by Charles Hancock, 506 Guelph St., Glen Williams, on Aug. 19. Luckily, the fire on the tank burnt out, fire prevention officer Larry Brassard said. Flames did shoot 60 feet into the air, which was "pretty spectacular."

Damage to the garage is estimated at \$15,000 and the cause is of suspicious origin, Mr. Brassard said on Monday. Mr. Hancock's dump truck was stored in the garage and was also damaged. The garage, which is separate from the house, is a complete write off, he added. Firefighters used two pumps and a rescue van, Mr. Brassard said.

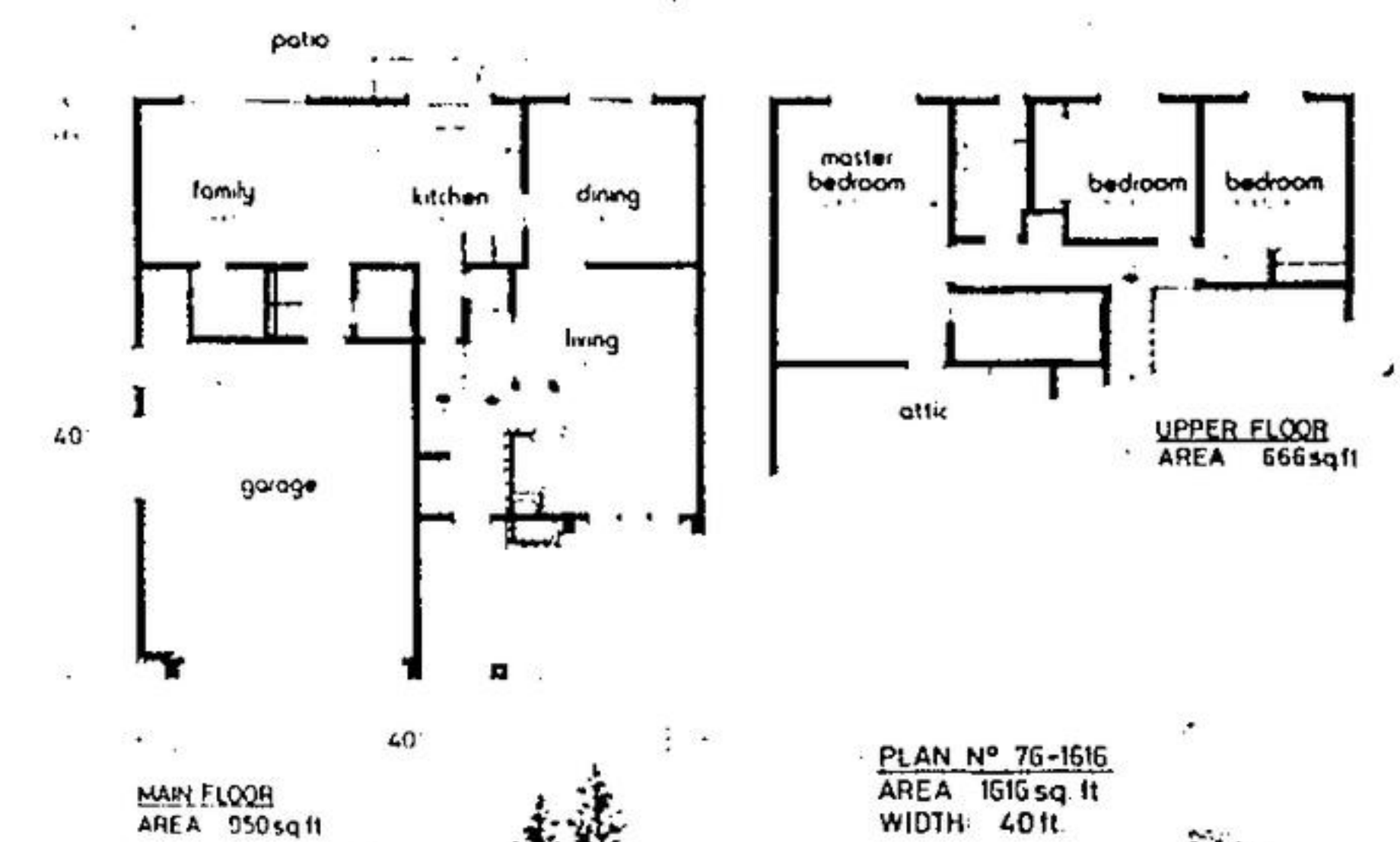

SPACIOUS CONTEMPORARY

The pleasing exterior of this three bedroom one-and-one-half storey contemporary has the lofty appearance of a country estate, featuring cedar shake or asphalt shingle roof, stone veneer chimney and a sloping roof extension over the rain-sheltered entrance.

Two steps down from the entrance takes you into the spacious living room with vaulted ceiling and corner fieldstone fireplace. This room affords easy access to both dining room and kitchen yet still provides seclusion for entertaining.

The U-shaped kitchen is conveniently central to the dining and family rooms, and has generous counters and cupboards. The adjoining three piece vanity bathroom, utility room with washer and dryer and the large storage area off the family room achieve the greatest possible convenience.

A variation of this plan, (Plan No. 77-1616) has a full basement into which the utility room could be moved, allowing expansion of the family room or additional storage area.

The already large family room has sliding doors connecting to the patio and is divided from the kitchen by a snack bar. This bar could be replaced by a separating wall which, combined with the removal of the utilities to the basement, could be of enormous benefit to the family with younger children - providing a vast indoor child-oriented area with easy access to the outdoors.

The upstairs has a luxuriously appointed master bedroom which has a three piece ensuite bath with skylight dome and a large closet connected to the attic storage area over the garage. This area could easily be developed into an even larger walk-in closet or some combination of closet-storage-office.
