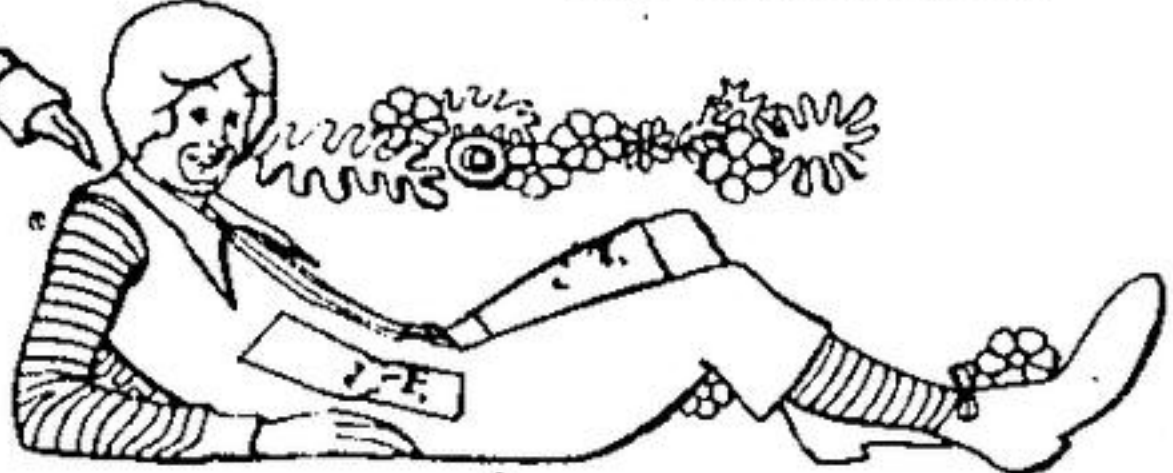
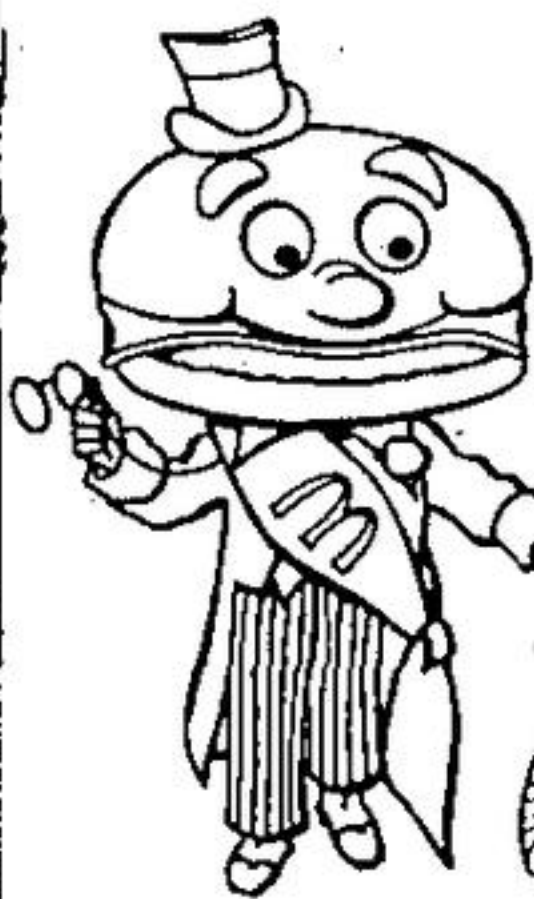

Paging the real 007

For those of us that grew up during the 1960s there's a certain nostalgia which forces us to at least consider going to view the latest James Bond film.

That's the case with me and my worst fears that it would not reach the levels of excellence I remember from my youth were fulfilled.

Roger Moore, who received North American popularity in the television series The Saint, comes across too stuffy for the rough and tumble secret agent that was molded originally by Sean Connery.

Moore, who is an excellent actor by any standard, however, seems to have an over confident flair about his abilities in the role he portrays in The Spy Who Loved Me.

As three hours of entertainment, the film also fails to move fast enough to keep the viewer from getting fidgety in his seat. The opening scenes are breathless and exciting as they usually are in a Bond film. The scenes involve a chase on skis in the

Austrian alps ending in a parachute freefall from a cliff. It is breathless.

The film once again sets the British secret agent in league with the Russian KGB. It reminded me of being nothing more than a rewrite of From Russia With Love.

And indeed it might be since the film is the first of several, I understand, that will be produced which are not written by the late Ian Fleming who created the character.

The films photographic qualities are certainly up to the level of past Bond films, particularly in the Egyptian pyramids and the desert.

Richard Kiel a brawny seven footer portrays the henchman of Curt Jurgens who is attempting to change man's lifestyle and create an Atlantis civilization. Kiel is cast as "Jaws" because of his steel jaws and teeth which can bite through locks, necks, and ironically - if you'll pardon the pun - sharks. While he does a superior job in his role there's always a nagging feeling when he's on screen that he's somehow not quite what he's made out to be, especially, when Moore and his co-star the lovely Barbara Bach must fight him face-to-face.

If you can sit through it, the final minutes of the film combine all the remembered qualities of a Bond film: the excitement, the suspense, and the hero getting the girl.

Now if they had cast Sean Connery in the role, well, maybe...
