Torontonian wins after disqualification

Six hours and many tours of Mosport's 2.5 mile road circuit ended in protest during the Molson Diamond Trans Am race held August 20. As a result of the complaint dealing with Peter Gregg's first place Porsche, the complainant and second place car captured first spot. Ludwig Heimrath's turbo charged Porsche 934 finished slightly ahead of the runner up drivers Gilles Villeneuve and Eddie Cheever.

The Villeneuve-Cheever car is sponsored by Unilock (formerly KNR Durastone) of Armstrong Ave. and owned by Faltz Racing Team, who flew the car in from West Germany for the race. It was a combination of driver ability and mechanical supremacy which brought the BMW 320i back before the remainder of the field.

The irony of the finish is in

the fact that the Unilock BMW the non-turbo charged version had approximately half the horsepower of the Porsches and other BMW's in the race, who enjoyed the turbo-charged feature.

The two drivers took one and one half hour shifts over the six hour jaunt, leaving Villeneuve to make it to the checkered flag. Villeneuve the 23-year-old Quebec native and Canadian Driving Champ won the title last year despite the loss of his sponsorship in the latter stages. This year however Villeneuve remains in contention for more championship titles. He currently ranks second in the Canadian Formula Atlantic Series, tenth in the World Championship Formula One and along with co-driver Eddie Cheever they rank number one in Group 5 of the World Championship of Makes.

Cheevers still new to racing at 19, shows potential for a fine future. BMW automobiles employs Cheevers as a works driver in their European field. Unilock General manager Wolf Mueller informs us that the BMW is looking for top spot in the Trans Am class, as well as 'Wolfs own desire to drive his BMW 2002ti, sedan to Halifax for the Atlantic Motorsport Park Canadian championship on September 10-18.

Other Georgetown entrants during the weekend had mixed fortunes. Geoff Walker driving a fine first year in the formula 100 series, led at one point during the race and had an almost positive third place finish, ran out of gas with less than three laps remaining.

Rupert Bragg-Smith however too his Titan home with a second place finish. Geoff is looking forward to Shannon-

ville on the Labour Day weekend and is even more excited about his invitation to Halifax for the September 16-18 championship. The trip to Atlantic Motorsport Park is only open to invitation and then only to the top ten finishers in each region.
