**Region backtracks, overrule precedent**

Halton region has decided against setting precedent and reversed a June decision to apply for approval of its proposed Milton landfill site under the Environmental Assessment Act.

Regional solicitor Mike Martin said applying for approval under the Environmental Protection Act would save time and money.

Council approved seeking the assessment act approval in June following an address by

David Estrin, lawyer for the Tremaine-Britannia Citizens' Group which is opposed to the proposed landfill site. Mr. Estrin said the assessment act would ensure a more thorough study of the project.

The Environmental Assessment Act is untried legislation used primarily by the province for approval of provincial projects. Halton, Mr. Martin said, would be setting precedent for landfill sites and would probably face tests before the courts before final approval is received.

Another difference between the two environmental laws is the manner in which the approvals are made. Under both acts a hearing board is held, but the hearing board can only recommend action subject to approval by the minister in projects heard under the Environmental Protection Act. Under the Environmental Assessment Act the minister could overturn a ruling of the hearing board which makes a decision.

He said the delay could be as much as 13 months and the cost as high as \$200,000.

**Model homes request reduced**

A resolution to permit Mountclair Development Limited to build four model homes in their Mullen Lane subdivision was discussed, re-worded then finally tabled pending a report from the solicitor because council is wary of compounding the existing dry well problem in Glen Williams.

Ward 2 Coun. Russ Miller suggested council permit Mountclair to build one model home to show the special features to be incorporated into the homes.

He felt that since the entire subdivision is to consist of only nine houses, the developer does not need four models in order to display his plans.

He pointed out that four houses would be almost half the total homes for the development and the Glen Williams residents would be sure to be upset by that much building before the problem with dry wells is cleared.

Ward 3 Coun. Peter Pomeroy opposed any building on Mullen Lane until council has a resolution accepted by the developer absolving council from any responsibility for further water problems in the area.

"What's going to happen if they cut through the acquirer again, even in just one spot?" Ward 3 Coun. Roy Booth reminded council that model homes are built to show the various styles as well as special features a developer puts into his homes.

Although he feels restricting the developer to one house is unfair he agreed that four houses is too many and suggested council permit him to build two or three houses.

Ward 4 Coun. Marilyn Serjeantson believes no building should be allowed until after the Sept. 15 deadline agreed upon with Karen Drive residents.

**83 sign area petition citing traffic danger**

Halton Hills council must take action to alleviate a dangerous situation for school children and pedestrians on Weber Drive, Duncan Drive and Moultrie Crescent, a Georgetown resident said last week.

Speaking to council last Tuesday, Al Roth, of 100 Weber Dr., said a three-way stop should be installed in front of George Kennedy School at Duncan and Weber Drives to reduce speeding on both streets.

Mr. Roth also presented council with a 83-name petition from residents in the area supporting the need for safer conditions.

He said two flashing orange signals should be put on either side of the Weber-Duncan Drive intersection to warn drivers of the school ahead. He also recommended a three way stop be set up at the west end of Moultrie Crescent, increased police patrols between 3:30 and 5:30 p.m. in the area
