After the ceremony the couple were driven in a 1914 Chalmers to North Halton Golf and Country Club where a reception was held.

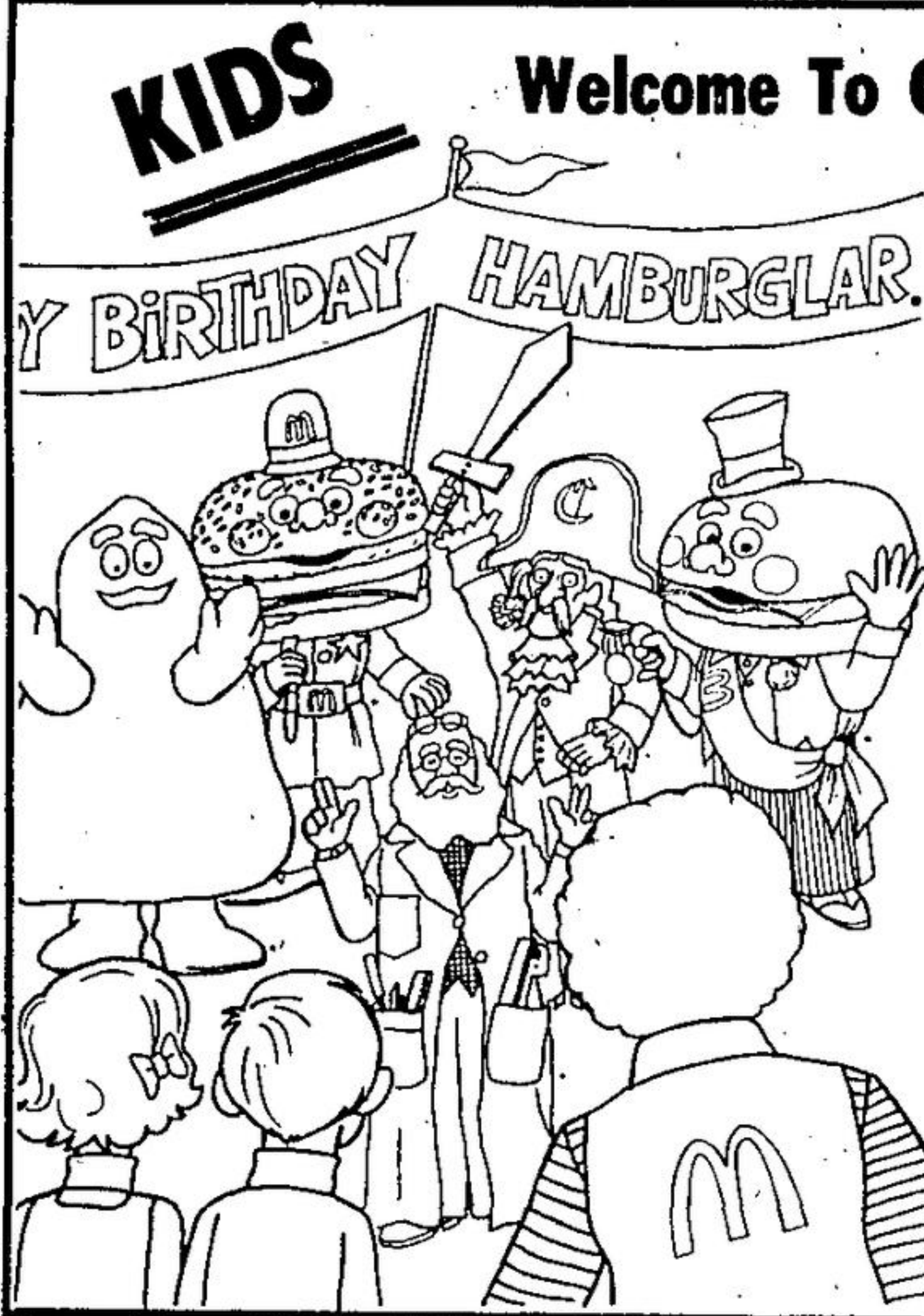

## Region review vetoed

Regional council has rejected a bid by the Bill 151 committee to have the province instigate an immediate review of regional government in Halton.

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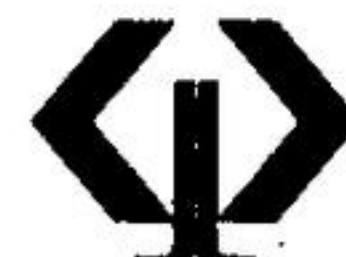
