Rebuff step down

Halton region chairman Ric Morrow tried unsuccessfully Wednesday to step down from chairmanship of the regional landfill committee.

Council adamantly refused to allow the move and ultimately disposed of the suggestion on a technicality. The suggestion by Mr. Morrow was not tabled before council as an agenda item.

"Nothing has concerned me more than the countinuing controversy over my position in the landfill site question," he told council.

He said he hadn't been able "to observe any degree of neutrality in the matter" and the only solution he believes is a return of the position to a member of council to chair the debate.

Mr. Morrow in an interview later said the landfill question is conducted by a committee of the whole council and that he might have erred in accepting the chairmanship of such a committee. He is also chairman for standing committees which report to council.

The difference lles, he explained, in the recommendations which are presented to committee. In the case of standing committees the recommendations come from elected officials while the landfill recommendations come from staff, which he feels obligated to support.

He believes the question must be resolved by elected politicians responsible to the electorate.

Mr. Morrow also admitted that some of the criticism levelled at his for his actions and handling of the question are also justified.

"I'm not sorry for my previous actions but I am trying to respond to the criticism which is to a degree well-founded."

Oakville Coun. Mac Anderson, however, urged the chairman to reconsider his position. "Whatever criticism there is couldn't possibly be as important as the mistake you are about to make."

He said he knew there was criticism but he acknowledged that council know also what it was doing in electing him to the post as chairman of Halton region.

"I really feel that landfill issue is one of the most important and controversial decisions council will make." Coun. Jack Raftis said. "You ". (Mr. Morrow) should be providing leadership by being in the chair. You have access to information from staff and consultants that does not get to council and you can give us

direction." He explained that prior to the formation of a committee of the whole for landfill the public works committee found difficulty in providing and interpreting information for council it received from var-

ious sources, Mr. Raftis sald he believes Mr. Morrow is overreacting to criticism. "We need the leadership of the chairman."

Mr. Morrow said he believes council has abdicated its responsibility by seeking his direction on the landfill question. He said the office of the chairman is affected by the adverse criticism.

Burlington Coun. Ben Ciprietti told Mr. Morrow that he must be prepared to accept the job for which he sought elec-

"I don't necessarily agree with the way you have handled the meetings, but that is your job," Mr. Ciprietti said. "It is a terrible precedent to start selecting projects to chair."
