## **Ontario Outdoors**

By R. C. (BOB) OLLIVIER The regular Trout season closes here on the 30th of September, so make a note of it and get in your last licks

In fact the season closes on the 15th in some areas. It seems like they just opened, and now we have to start watching for the various season closures. There are lots of Chinook Salmon in the river mouths now, but the Coho are mainly out a ways yet.

Jim Staddon and I tried to get out last week, but the five foot rollers prevented that. We fished in the harbour areas and put up with the rough waters. The Chinook were rolling or "porpoising" and they just don't seem to hit when they are in that mood. The large "party" boars were getting out and picking up plenty of Coho at the three mile mark.

It seemed that anyone that got out there was getting lots of fish, mainly on Charteuse colored ANDY REEKER spoons, or Red Flourescent Flatfish in the T4 size. But then again it all depends on who catches the first fish and what he was using, because you can be sure that everyone else will put that on their line, and then that's all that is presented to the fish, and therefore it turns out to be the number one fish getter.

I watched as several fishermen came in on that rough water just to get some Andy Reeker's and they had spray paint the correct color a d wait for them to dry before heading back out three miles on the huge rollers. It did seem however, that a DODGER must go ahead of the lure at least when fishing at the deeper and farthest out fishing spots.

The eight Coho I photographed were all good clean fish, with the exception of one lamprey scar. The new hunting regulations are now available, and

I would suggest that you get a copy and study it as soon as

possible. There are always changes of one type or another, and ignorance of the law is no excuse. Duck opens Sept. 15th north of Hwy. 17 and Sept. 24 in Southern Ontario. For me it is always hard to progress from fishing to hunting, and I never know which one to choose, often taking along my rod as well as my gun, to

some of the areas in Southern Ontario. It is well that these two tremendous sports over lap in Ontario. Maybe a good pastime would be to take your duck call with you when fishing Lake Ontario and practice calling while fishing for salmon.

There is no shartage of ducks down there, and it just

might satisfy your feeling for both sports. As I have said on many oicasions, there is always lots to do in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.

This is not to say we should be complacent, in fact the contrary, improvement always is the key to the future.
