Grade 4 next year. Halton board of education Thursday approved an expanded French core program in elementary schools despite opposition from some trustees and warnings by staff that some parents won't like it. The program will advance one

grade each year until Grade 8. If by Jan. 13, the board can determine that there is sufficient interest in early and late (grade 1 and Grade 7) immersion classes, development and implementation of those classes will take place in time for the 1978 school year.

The cost of the expanded core program to the board is expected to be about \$67,000 in 1979 and rise to \$103,000 by 1980, Bruce Mather, superintendent of program said. That figure includes program writing costs of about \$4,000 a year, he added. The ministry of


