## Norval water funds pending

Money from the province to help pay for piping water to Norval won't be forthcoming until 1978 or '79, Halton chairman the Morrow told Halton Hills council last week.

Mr. Morrow told council (last Tuesday) he might know in the next few months when the money would be available and as soon as the province makes the commitment, the region would go to tender and carry the cost of construction until it gets the money.

He urged council members to get in touch with George Kerr, minister of the environment. "The squeaky wheel gets the grease," he said.

The region has told the province that it prefers the money in a lump sum, which will mean the ministry of the environment will not be required to go to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval as would be the case if the cost was to be debentured, he said.

He hoped that the cabinet would give its approval to the expenditure before the end of the present term.

Mr. Morrow was before council as part of his annual tour of the four municipal councils in Halton: in a question and answer period fol-

lowing his prepared address, he said one region-wide rate for water and sewage costs would be advantageous in north Halton but it won't happen until after there is equalized sharing of costs in the region.

"It would be a contentious and dividing issue," Mr. Morrow said, "but in the long range, equalized assessment is best for all."

He said that the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation is completely funding a major sewage study of 15 Halton.

The first draft of Halton's official plan should be ready by early December, Mr. Morrow said. He anticipated little if any conflict between it and Halton Hills' official plan, which is due about the same time.

The lack of parking spots for Acton volunteer firefighters will be discussed in committee of the whole. Works committee made the decision Monday following a discussion in camera of a report prepared by town engineer Bob Austin.

\$4,000 grading

Works committee approved the ministry of environment's offer of \$4,000, and agreed to match the sum needed to complete the grading of the former Georgetown Sanitary Landfill Site for final site closure.

Bob Austin town engineer suggested to works committee that in 1978 monies be included in the budget for final topsoiling and seeding.

He said revised cost estimates indicate that about \$20,000 would be the final cost to close the site in a condition acceptable to the ministry.

Mr. Austin said the \$4,000 should be taken out of the present operating budget for garbage collection to allow about \$8,000 worth of work to be done this year towards the final closing of the site.
