

Norval water funds pending

Money from the province to help pay for piping water to Norval won't be forthcoming until 1978 or '79, Halton chairman Ric Morrow told Halton Hitts council last week.

Mr. Morrow told council (last Tuesday) he might know in the next few months when the money would be available and as soon as the province makes the committment, the region would go to tender and carry the cost of construction until it gets the money.
