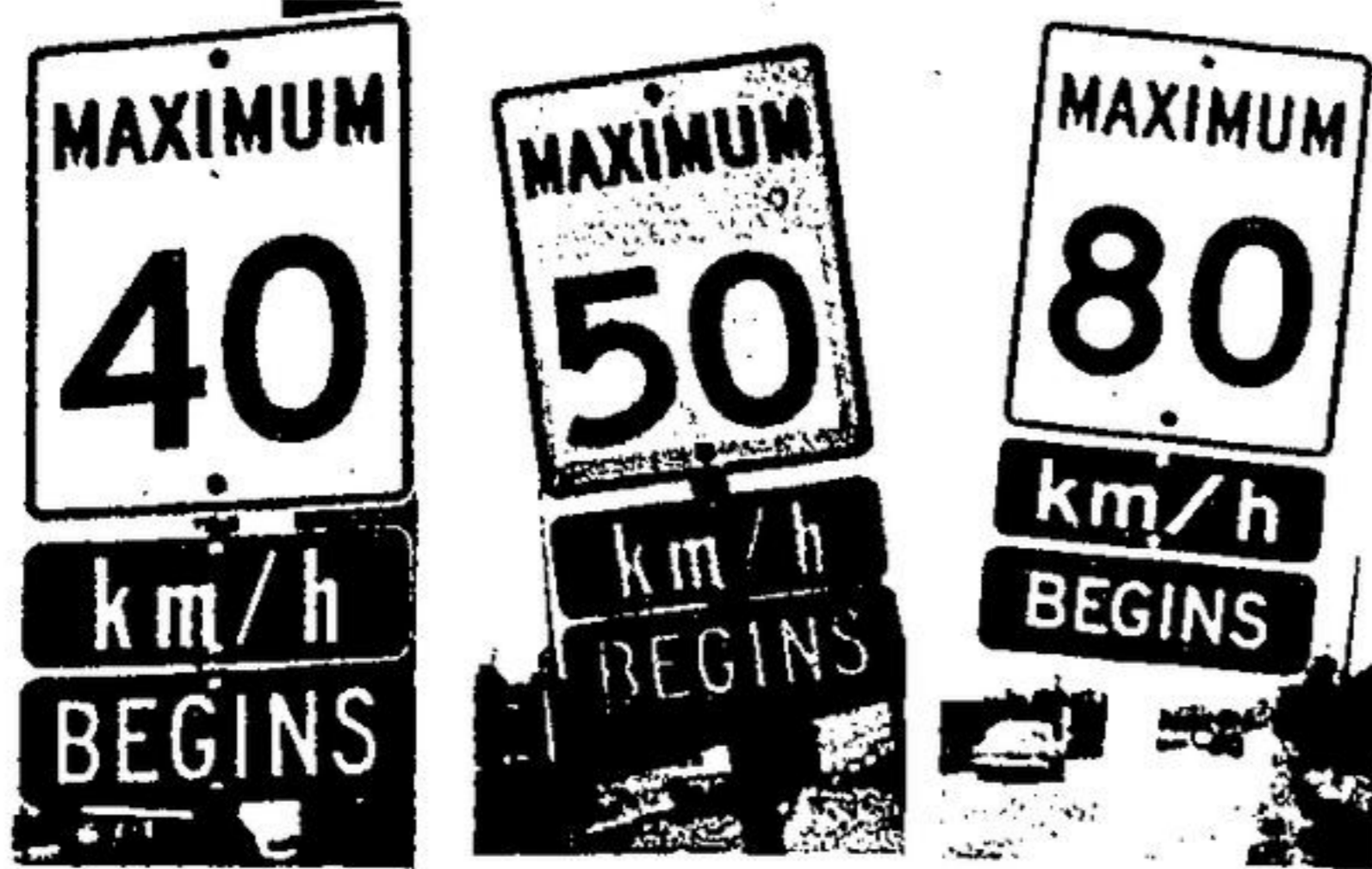

Suddenly, with metric, it seems you are allowed to drive faster, according to what's indicated on your speedometer. Last Wednesday the unfamiliar metric speed zones warning signs went up in Halton Hills. Finally the government has got to the people on the street with its metric notices.

Probably the best thing to do if you drive, is to put the kilometers per mile marks right on your speedometer with nail polish (bright red?), paint or some indelible ink.

If you haven't marked your speedometer yet, perhaps, because you're not sure, or can't find a conversion kit, you can use these photos to remind you self and mark it accurately as possible.

At the 24 miles per hour (mph) mark 40 kilometres per hour (km/h).

At the 31 mph mark 50 km/h.

At the 50 mph mark 80 km/h.

At the 62 mph mark 100 km/h.

This last speed is the key to the conversion of the metric system to the old miles per hour that many in Ayrton, Georgetown and Esquesping grew up with. It may be that the word miles may go to the way of the league, but for now, try to remember that one kilometre is a sixth of a mile. It'll come in handy when you have to figure distances.

'We were appalled' at our first council meeting

This non-basement plan places the washer, dryer and furnace in a convenient storage space in the inner hall. Cover the space with lowered doors and add character and charm to the hallway.

The master bedroom features a large walk in closet, a three piece ensuite, and patio access through the sliding glass doors. The second and third bedrooms make the best use of available space to accommodate a growing family.

It's easy to organize packed away items in the entire wall of cupboards in the garage. Add more doors, or put in shelves to keep everything within easy reach.

Sliding glass doors from either the dining area or the master bedroom open onto the full length patio, and put summer fun just steps away. The fireplace set in the living room wall of glass incorporates an outside barbecue sharing the same chimney.
