## Opponents ignore library meet as Cedarvale plan revealed

By BOB RUTTER Herald staff writer Opponents of the proposed \$750,000 library at Cedarvale Park were conspicous by their absence Wednesday as the Halton Hills library board officially unveiled the design

of the building. Only two members of the public-one proponent and another a design student at Sheridan College-accepted the board's announced invitation to attend the unvieling at the Acton library.

"I feel because of the interest-the negative comments against the library-I thought the people might want to know what they are objecting to," board chairman said following the meeting.

The design, proposed by architect Phillip Brook, of Toronto, would allow 21,000 books to be placed in the 15,000 foot two-storey building.

Located on about one-tenth of the two-acre site at the park, the building would incorporate a meeting hall with audiovisual facilities and junior library accessible from Main Street south with administration, reference and adult books on a lower level accesible from a reconstructed driveway into the site with doorway facing onto Maple

An Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) hearing has been called for the project following a protest by more than 3,500 Georgetown residents. Upposition is mainly against the site of the new library which will occupy parkland and a loboggan hill. No date has been

Mr. Brook said the design work is 90 per cent complete with only about eight weeks


