Opponents ignore library meet as Cedarvale plan revealed

Opponents of the proposed \$750,000 library at Cedarvale Park were conspicuous by their absence Wednesday as the Halton Hills library board officially unveiled the design of the building.

Only two members of the public-one proponent and another a design student at Sheridan College-accepted the board's announced invitation to attend the unveiling at the Acton library.

"I feel because of the interest in the negative comments against the library-I thought the people might want to know what they are objecting to," board chairman said following the meeting.

The design, proposed by architect Phillip Brook, of Toronto, would allow 21,000 books to be placed in the 16,000 foot two-storey building.

Located on about one-tenth of the two-acre site at the park, the building would incorporate a meeting hall with audiovisual facilities and junior library accessible from Main Street south with administration, reference and adult books on a lower level accessible from a reconstructed driveway into the site with doorway facing onto Maple Avenue.

An Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) hearing has been called for the project following a protest by more than 3,500 Georgetown residents. Opposition is mainly against the site of the new library which will occupy parkland and a toboggan hill. No date has been set.

Mr. Brook said the design work is 90 per cent complete with only about eight weeks required for working

drawings. Cost of the design is \$18,000 which will have to be paid whether the project is accepted or rejected.

He would not say how much long-term delay could increase cost noting that any increase due to inflation would have to be absorbed within the limits set by Halton Hills council.

Council earlier approved the project cutting its cost to \$750,000 from \$876,000 and stipulating that the floor area be reduced to 16,000 from about 18,000 square feet.

"If the delay is extended," Mrs. Lister commented, "we would obviously have to go back to council and say you gave us these limits and we would have to: a) build a smaller library; or give us

more money."

Library board opposes the resurrection of 1974 plans for renovating the present Church Street library contending they are not practical. Such a plan has gained support by residents and some members of council.

Strongly opposed to the development of a new library away from the downtown core, Coun. Walter Biehn, also a member of library board, said after the meeting the design is attractive but he still remains opposed.

The proposed building would have facility for handicapped persons in wheelchairs. Construction of washrooms and elevator facilities for such persons is covered by a 100 per cent grant from the federal

government.

Lower level of the building would be setback into the side of the hill making a sub-basement for the area facing toward Main Street.

The upper level would have a terrace area immediately adjacent to the meeting hall and audio-visual floor plan. It would not cover the entire lower level allowing a skylight to provide interior lighting and providing a sloped roof from upper to lower level.

Halton Hills recreation department has already stated, board members said, that the present driveway entrance to the Cedarvale Park will be reconstructed south on Main Street near the proposed library site.

ARTISANS TO BUY EQUIPMENT

Credit Valley Artisans will be buying additional equipment and offering more courses this year, public relations officer Connie Karlson said following a general meeting Tuesday at Cedarvale.

The Artisans received a Winter grant for \$815.92 and once the group matches the figure, a table loom, warping mill, eight silk screens five easels and two new wheels for pottery.

The group has not decided how many table looms or

warping mills will be bought but they did decide on buying wood for silk screen to keep the price low.

The group discussed renting all equipment, but Mrs. Karlson said that will be discussed in further detail at the next meeting.

The group watched slides of racquet, a course given in Chinese pottery and Mrs. Karlson said the slides were just beautiful. The evening, she said, was organized but she was disappointed at the low turnout.

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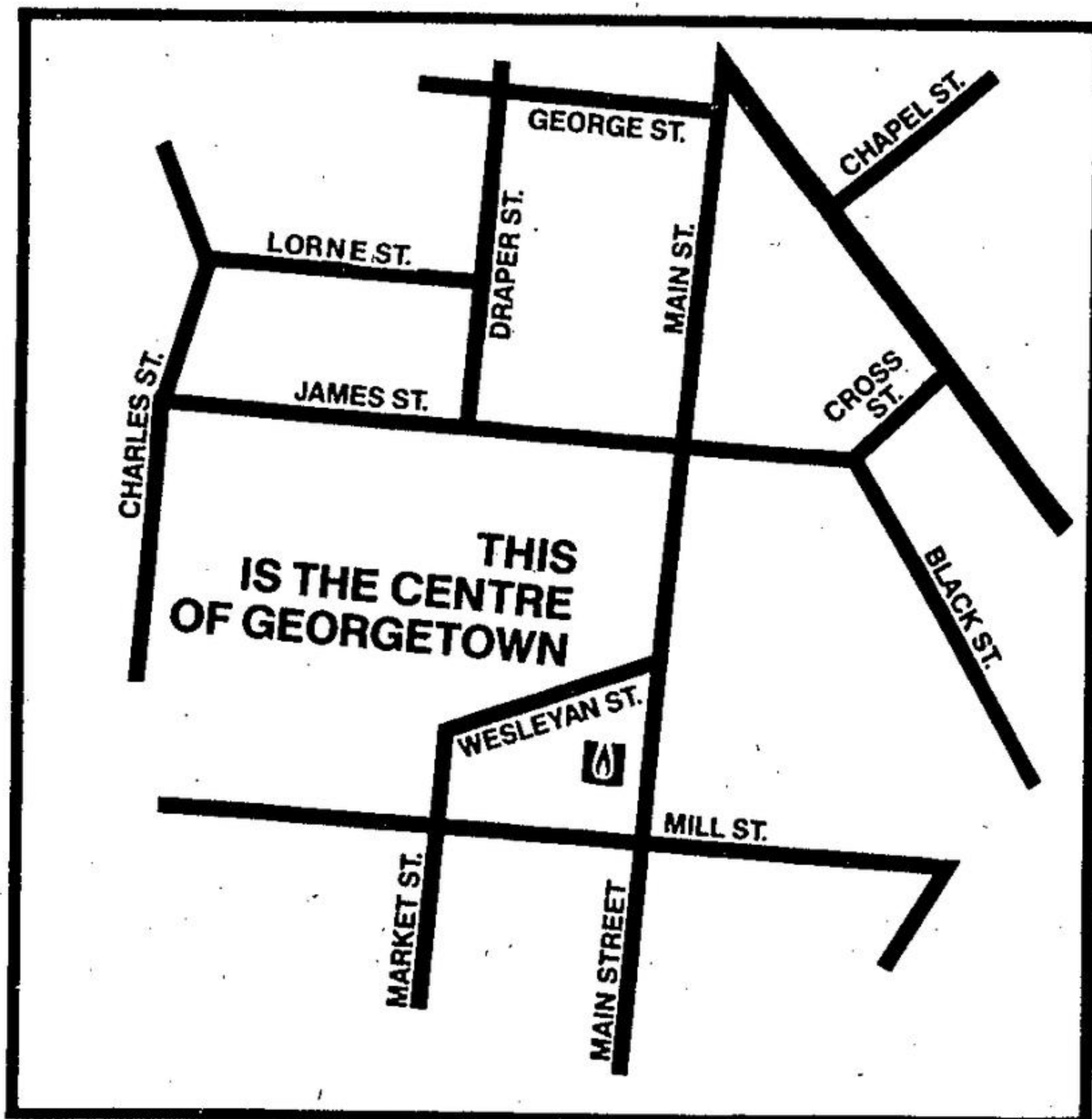
