A club system would initially only accept players to a maximum number of 15 or 16 per team, coach and manager other registering players would of necessity go on a waiting list awaiting another team, coach and manager. Sufficient teams, chaches and managers would enable a league to be formed, each team providing a member to Mosquitos skill. Even so at the organize the league. Under this system the player seeks a team and the team seeks the player. It is the players choice to try out for the team, coach and manager of his choosing; and vice versa for the team to approach any player. Each team may also have to provide

a referee, preferably qualified. would prefer that each team remain within one club in order that we can organize club leagues which could include interdistrict teams on a non-competitive basis. At the same time coaching could be combined, club, league, team 6 and interdistrict. I will expand on this next week. I also propose that we operate a coaching seminar and refereeing seminar shortly before the start of next season and that we consider payment to our referees on a scale basis in four stages. 1) qualified and experienced; 2) newly qualified; 3) unqualified and experienced and 4) unqualified and Kruizers 3 inexperienced. If a child truly wants to be involved in hockey, then by all means he should be able to, and having parents who are concerned and interested in their play, can make all the difference in the world. Parents can make or break a child's sports world, and that sometimes can be hazar-

It upsets me to see a child forced out on the ice when he or she cannot even skate properly, yet the parents are screaming and yelling "Go get them son". When the child cannot go get'em because he can't skate properly, he then has to face his parents dissapointment and in turn he may

feel guilty for not living up to their expectations. Parents can also have a reverse effect on the child. They may be supportive of the child's wishes, but not put any pressure on being good, just an honest desire to see their child having fun and playing at the level of skill that benefits him. Young hockey players can get really down and out about losing a game, and strong interested parents can then make the world bright again with their support. I have heard many a child say proudly. "My Dad is here to watch me". That child will then go out and skate his legs off to make his parent proud of him. This to me is the right way to feel. Any parent who verbally or physically forces his child on the ice has their own interestes at heart, and not a true sense of the sport.
