## Garbage proposals studied

Three major companies, branding expertise in the resource recovery field that extends around the globe, made their bids to Halton Region Thursday to build garbage reclamation plants here that would virtually eliminate the need for the massive landfill site proposed for rural Milton.

Regional chairman Ric Morrow told the audience that the regional staff will be studying the three alternatives and reporting to the public works committee, which in turn will make recommendations to council.

Each of the spokesmen outlined their company's offers to construct recovery plants all similar in operation, that would transform Halton's daily garbage output of 500 tons into inert ash and usable energy.

Nearly 100 Halton residents including several regional councillors and Milton Mayor Don Gordon, turned out for a special meeting to hear representatives of the Dominion Bridge Co. Ltd., M. and T. Chemicals Ltd. and Reed Ltd. Andco Torrax Ltd. explain how

they could "get the most out of (Halton's) garbage."

A clean, odorless steam is collected, for which several Halton industries have offered a market. The revenue from the sale of such energy would be about \$15 per ton of garbage.

Mr. Stevens estimated that such a plant would take three years to build and could cost \$20 million. Dominion Bridge would employ the Cope Group to operate a selected landfill site, as it is currently doing at a similar dump in Hamilton-Wentworth Region, which will ultimately be reclaimed and turned into a recreational area.

M. and T. Chemicals' director of marketing Arthur Child claimed that his company's brand new recovery plant in Milwaukee can handle up to 400,000 tons a year of that city's garbage output, as well as supplying enough steam to the Wisconsin Electric Power Company to light 30,000 homes.

**SPACIOUS SPLIT LEVEL**

Here's a contemporary three bedroom design which offers a number of amenities establishing a tone of luxury and open air spaciousness. The rustic exterior impression is in keeping with the almost rural openness of the indoor areas.

Four steps lead up from the sunken-entrance foyer to the large L-shaped living-dining combination. The living room has a charming bow window and window seat, and the dining area leads onto the rear sundeck via optional sliding doors.

The U-shaped kitchen and breakfast nook may be closed off from the dining room providing seclusion for entertaining.

The large family room, down three steps from the nook, connects to the rear patio and has a corner stone fireplace with a barbecue grill built in on the patio side.
