Councillors mileage under scrutiny by region

Halton region council has called for a report and guidelines on mileage paid councillors after it learned the 1977 budget is overspent.

Council learned the cost to date is \$5,186.93 while the budget is \$5,130. Some members have yet to be paid.

Included in the mileage is \$261.58 for mileage owed to former Halton Hills Coun. Ernie Sykes who was defeated in his bid for re-election last

December. As a result, council is considering setting policy that all mileage will have to be paid prior to a member leaving council.

Mr. Sykes mileage can not be charged back to the 1976 budget since the books have been closed and audited. It will be paid as an overpayment on the 1977 budget.

Mileage is paid to members of council to offset the cost of attending meetings on region

business. The tone of the debate caused umbrage on the part of some members who sit on several committees and live in north Halton.

Figures attached to the report indicate Halton Hills councillors are among the highest paid because the distance is greater and because most are members of several committees.

Coun. Russ Miller said later that it is unfair for members of

council living in north Halton to subsidize the region when the bulk of members from the south are within a short distance of meetings.

Mr. Miller, whose mileage payment totalled \$836.95 says that should council remove the mileage allowance because of a one-third tax free payment of salary, it would be an imposition on him. He is a full-time member. Since January he believes he has driven

almost 11,000 miles on government business.

He argues that it takes from 30 to 45 minutes for Halton Hills councillors to attend meetings and travelling as much as 70 miles round-trip the cost would be too great to ask any one person to pay.

This year council approved formation of three new committees which were not

considered in the budget. These are: community and social services; Bill 151; and the building committee.

Mr. Miller in a letter to administration committee suggests the mileage allowance be retained. He notes also that he personally sits on five regional committees and the Children's Aid Society and three of its committees.
