

Soccer Report **FOOTDall** Cedarvale?

The Pee Wees have been eliminated from the Halton & Peel Cup following the largest defeat in a long, long time. Waterloo ran out easy winners by 11-2, leading 4-0 after 15 minutes and 8-0 at the half. In the second half, with the assistance of Waterloo players, we only went down by a 3-2

margin with Pat Promerano and Gary Lockwood scoring. With a full squad of players last Thursday and promised for Saturday I had high hopes for a good cup result. However, one by one, for various reasons, players pulled out and falled to show up and yes, again we had nine players only for the trip to Waterloo.

This brings to attention a problem of our rep soccer this year. Lack of full committment from players has bedevited our rep soccer all year. Poor turn out for matthes and training, and lack of parental support in many

This lack of committment to team effort is, I believe, a major factor in the loss of so many coaches, managers and players. I believe that inter district competition is the way to foster improvement in our playing standards. I also feel that players should have the benefits of house league, interdistrict league and school soccer and not be restricted to just one of those.

A press report comment attributed to high school football coach Mike McMahon stated he would like his team to play a match under Cedarvale's flood lights. I would not like such a move. The soccer field was given to minor steeer exclusively many years ago according to a council minute. Further, the present schedule of games makes the playing of any more matches an impossibility in the time available. Mike's comment again shows up the lack of facilities all round in town. Another point to make is that Cedarvale is probably not long enough in yardage and the goal posts are purely soccer type, and dual purpose goal posts cause problems for soccer; and many for Canadian football. Otherwise, if we had sufficient fields,

then why not? I am curious enough to wonder why Mike would want to use Cedarvale anyway as the high school field was only alloted to us until the end of July. Soccer was advised that some repair work was to be done commencing August and this does not appear to have been done to date and so the high school has been available to Mike for the latter part of

The facility shortage is further highlighted by the complete loss of Cedarvale's two pitches following last week's rain. Atom and girl's semi finals have been cancelled as also have Pee Wee play-off games. At time of writing it is very uncertain whether the field will become available for any soccer, minor or senior.

Fixtures have been set up on a day to day basis as a result of the field shortages and we ask that all those still contending league and cup bear with us.

The Mosquitos also went out of the Halton and Pee Wee cup loss to Burlington by 3-0. This was a good match which could have gone the other way according to coach and referee (Paul Hulbert and Bill Barclay). An early penalty goal gave Burlington the incentive and hard though the homesters tried could not break the visitors defensive barriers. A half million Coho eggs will be collected from the Credit River and another half million Chinook eggs from Bronte Creek. Apparently new federal regulation restrict the importing of eggs from the west coast because of possible disease. These eggs will be the only ones for stocking and it is hoped that they will hatch and give us a continuation of the great salmon runs we have experienced here each fall for the last few years. The eggs will be shipped to the hatchery at Wiarton and should be available for stocking in the spring of 1979. The return of these fish will be the fall of 1980.

It is not expected to be a good return for the amount of effort and time put in. The eggs are expected to be poor due to contaminants in Lake Ontario. There are eggs now at the hatchery at Chatsworth that were obtained from the west coast before the federal regulation came into effect.
