Radio economics course offered

If you live in Halton Hills and would like to attend some evening courses but can't because of lack of transportation, or some other reason, you still can — and in the comfort of your own home.

Open College-Ryerson broadcasts university credit courses and certifies courses and a variety of others weekly on radio station CJIT-FM (91.1) in Toronto.

This season the college is offering university credit courses in two subjects. One, on economics, is called Money, Power and Politics and will be conducted by economists Dian Cohen and Gordon Cleveland.

Developmental Psychology is also a university credit course and covers man's development from birth to death. Both courses can be used to ward a Ryerson degree, a degree from Atkinson College at York University and other universities around Ontario.

A certificate course on Aging is also being offered and the college feels it will be attractive to anyone with older par-

ents for example, or who works with older people or who is wondering about getting old.

Each course is broadcast three times weekly, weekends included.

Of course the broadcasts are free, if you want just to listen to them, but if you'd like a

university credit, the economics course costs \$110, the psychology course costs \$100 and there is a \$2 registration fee for the music courses which will provide you with an outline of the music to be aired. The fees include all texts and course outlines.

If you arrive by car The parking areas has space for 12,000 cars. So it's a good idea to make sure all passengers in your car know the name of the parking area and your location. Noting the licence number and make and colour of the car is also a very good idea.
