## Flood warning issued

Credit Valley Conservation Authority (CVCA) issued a flood alert Friday to all municipalities in the watershed, but despite almost continuous rainfall during the weekend no major flooding was reported.

CVCA spokesman Joan Rolings said localized flooding in some areas, particularly in Mississauga, did result in some flooded basements and fast flowing ditches, but the Credit River did not pose a threat to rea residents.

She said the conservation authority was expecting a bad weekend because of the expected predicted 25 to 44 mm of rain but by noon Saturday the water level in the river was less than the high level recorded the weekend previous.
