Don't snag!

Further to the quality of our streams and rivers, the Ministry of Natural Resources has been conducting examinations of local rivers. The West Credit, Speed and Eramosa rivers were done this year by a crew equipped with a "shocker" that stuns the fish and thereby enables the crew to collect them for identification and examination. They are then released unharmed.

Small dams and diversion channels are a detriment to the water flow and may leave prime spawning areas high and dry. These dams are controlled by the LAKE AND RIVERS IMPROVEMENT ACT and may draw heavy fines. Thirty five convictions under this act were registered in 1976 and 1977. The convicted landowner is liable for court cost AND rehabilitation costs as well. The maximum fine is \$5,000. A Habitat Assessment Biologist led the examining crew, as they checked for any changes in water quality or temperature indicating poorer habitat for fish species. Aquatic insects also were considered as they are important food items for fish.

A word from BUZZ RAMSEY of Luhr Jensen and Sons Ltd. They are the makers of FLASHTAIL Salmon jigs. "If they'll eat worms, they'll eat anything. Try Luhr's Lures." This is his fun way of saying, don't limit yourself to just one lure because it caught fish yesterday. Be innovative.

FISH SEASONS—Walleye closes Nov. 30 in Peterborough area, and most of the rest of the Province runs till next March. Bass, most areas close Nov. 30 and ALL Trout with the exception of the special seasons under schedule four in the summary of the fishing regulations. "Fall Fishing for Rainbow and Brown Trout" and schedule 20 "ALL year fishing for Rainbow Trout and Brown Trout".

Take note of the following and make sure you and your children don't snag fish. "It is illegal to catch or kill a fish with a hook or hooks of any instrument manipulated in such a manner as to pierce or hook a fish in any part of the body OTHER THAN THE MOUTH". The rule goes on to say "Snagged fish must be released. Every person who catches any fish, the catching, taking, or retaining of which is contrary to the Ontario fishery regulations, and shall immediately RETURN SUCH FISH TO THE WATER FROM WHICH IT WAS TAKEN".

It is in the regulation; it is law; don't try to get away with it. Lets keep our act clean in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
