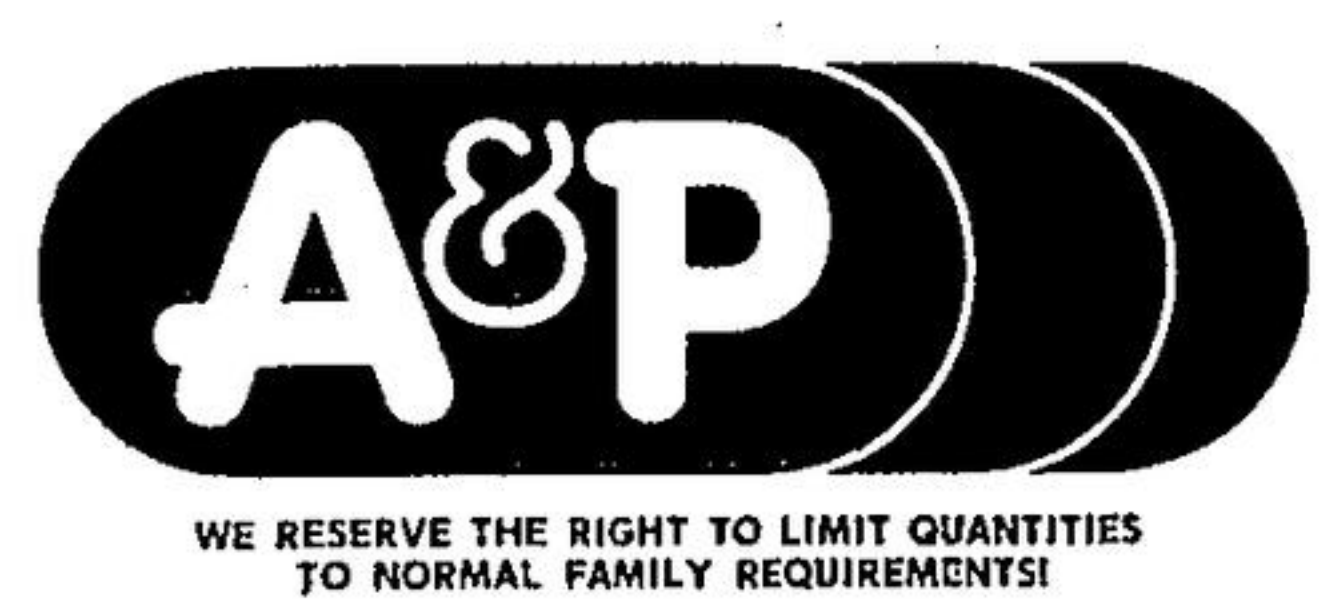

d". They're constantly dragging the same people into the courts, and the same people are constantly coming out with grins on their faces.

People who are guilty of destroying property should be held accountable for their actions. However, according to recent statements made by the Minister of Education, the cause of vandalism seems to have its roots in the fact that the people who do the damage feel that the property damaged "does not really belong to anybody", and there may be a good deal of truth in this statement for, as we make our schools larger and larger, and raise the impersonality and institutionalism, we set a course for which the consequences are obvious. It is in the light of this deliberation that I have written a letter to the Minister of Education and herewith publish the contents. I hope we will be forgiven by the reader since I make direct reference to my own home-town:

Dear Tom:

I heard on the news that great concern was being expressed for the vandalism that was taking place in the schools in Metropolitan Toronto and the opinion that was expressed that the people who were committing the vandalism seem to indicate that they felt that nobody really owned the property that they were vandalising and it was also expressed that some way must be found to point out to these people, or to the students, that it was actually the taxpayer who paid the shot.

I could not help but react to the whole scene considering the fight that we went through for three years regarding our small school in the Village of Norval. And one of the arguments that we put forward in favour of its continued existence was the fact that young people going to the school felt as if they were part of the community and that they had a responsibility towards their school.

I wonder if you will ever learn the lesson that politics begin with the assumption of personal responsibility in the community and that responsibility is shared by children as well as adults. We know that a long time ago in our little Village and we are willing to share it. We can tell you how to eliminate vandalism. We can tell you how to instill a personal sense of responsibility in your people. We can give you some indication of how to reduce juvenile crime and we can prove that quality of education is not hampered by smallness. We can also show you that the cost is neither greater nor lesser. All you have to do is listen.

The Village of Norval is still here but much the lesser for the absence of its school. If you want to eliminate vandalism remember - smallness improves the sense of personal responsibility and the community is the denominator of the body politic. We may never agree on this but I thought you should know my views.

Dixon helps team at top
