Soccer Report

Whilst I feel that we've improved our organization this year there are areas still to be improved. Hopefully we will improve these areas and maintain the improvements achieved this year.

The executive have a couple of meetings prior to the annual general meeting in November when a new executive will take over. We also have to bear in mind changes will be made in our system for 1978. Firstly, due to a decree handed down by Ontario Soccer that we are not a bona fide association and secondly because I and others feel that the current system does not work. A re-organization is therefore inevitable and as I believe that the club system is the way to go I shall move in that direction. Those who do not agree will move in another direction. There is a great soccer potential in Georgetown and district and I know many people have the same opinion. The area of disagreement is how best to use that potential.

I do not see any reason for the restriction of soccer providing that there are sufficient, enthusiastic, knowledgeable and un knowledgeable persons involved in the sport.

In a club system the club has the sole responsibility of its own coaching, managing and administration duties, formation and operation of leagues in conjunction with other clubs in the same age group. As previously explained the clubs finds the player and the player finds the club. A club can have as many teams in one or all age groups as the club considers it can handle. The club would also have sole responsibility for fitting out the uniform and financing all activities of club and affiliation to its league formation.

The purchase of equipment is probably better in bulk buying and there seems to be no reason why a bulk order could not be arranged. The major problem in the current system is the lack of people, followed very closely by the lack of decent facilities and the application or use of those people. I believe the club system will go a long way to solve the people problem, in numbers and in application of their energies. Education of coaches, managers and referees and others is also necessary and hopefully an area we can do something about before next season commences.

The pressure for better fields and facilities must continue until at an acceptable standard for all activities and not just for soccer. Our rep girls again did us proud in reaching the Halton & Peel cup finals which were held last week. Regrettably a technicality put us out and so we became runners-up for this year. The result if doubly unfortunate as the girls were up against the most the whole season and to come through at the end is highly creditable to them. The weather beat us for our finals day and in spite of the thoughts of some people the president has no control over this aspect of the game.

The games are to be re-scheduled at Cedarvale (if available) or Moore Park and we are hopeful that the originally appointed referees are available. Obviously as soon as final arrangements are made all coaches, or managers and referees will be advised.

Incidentally "Hibbee" comes from the nickname of a supporter of the Scottish soccer club Hibernian from Edinburgh. In conclusion for this week I again say that the opinions expressed here are mine and not those of the executive. See you.
