Mavericks pounce Raiders improvements necessary

The Chrysler Raiders played poorly Friday night and deserved what they got. A 4-1 loss to the Fort Erie Mavericks.

Goaltender Mario MacDonald had a bad night, but then too, so did all the players in front of him. The problem Friday stemmed from what general manager Jack Handy called "post '76 victory". With last year's season ended so late in the year, the Raiders seem to have forgotten that the '76 winning season is over and that 1977 could be a completely different story.

That, along with the fact of other teams still treating the

Raiders as the victors could be the controlling factors of the Maverick win.

With three minutes left in the game, it looked as if the Raiders would be skunked, but then Juri Kudrasova got together with Tom Daley to score the only Raider goal, at the 17:37 mark.

The Mavericks gained two of their four goals in the first period. Pat Flynn took the first Fort Erie goal, with assists from Dan Blair and Gary Hill. Flynn then came back about five minutes later with another goal, again assisted by Dan Blair.

Wasted again in the second

period, the Raiders gave Fort Erie another two goals. Gary Hill and Pat Flynn teamed up for the third Maverick goal four minutes into the period and ten minutes later, Al Longmuir captured the final Maverick goal with assists coming from Jack Ashworth and Dave Storring.

Surprisingly the Raiders outshot Fort Erie 34-25. Penalties were fair and kept to a minimum. The only two Raider penalties that stood out were two five minute misconducts, one given to Art Webster, the other to Andre Nole. Manager Jack Handy noted that perhaps if the

Raiders had hit a little harder and more frequently, they may have won.

Two more players have been signed to the team. Centreman Neil Cotton, who is an assistant coach for the senior Rebel football team, will be returning for another Raider season on the ice, and Pat Maloney of Brampton will take up his position as left winger when the football season winds up in Brampton.

With two losses to their record, the Raiders cannot afford any more defeats, especially of the Friday night nature. Thorold tests the staying power of the Raiders Friday night at 8:30.

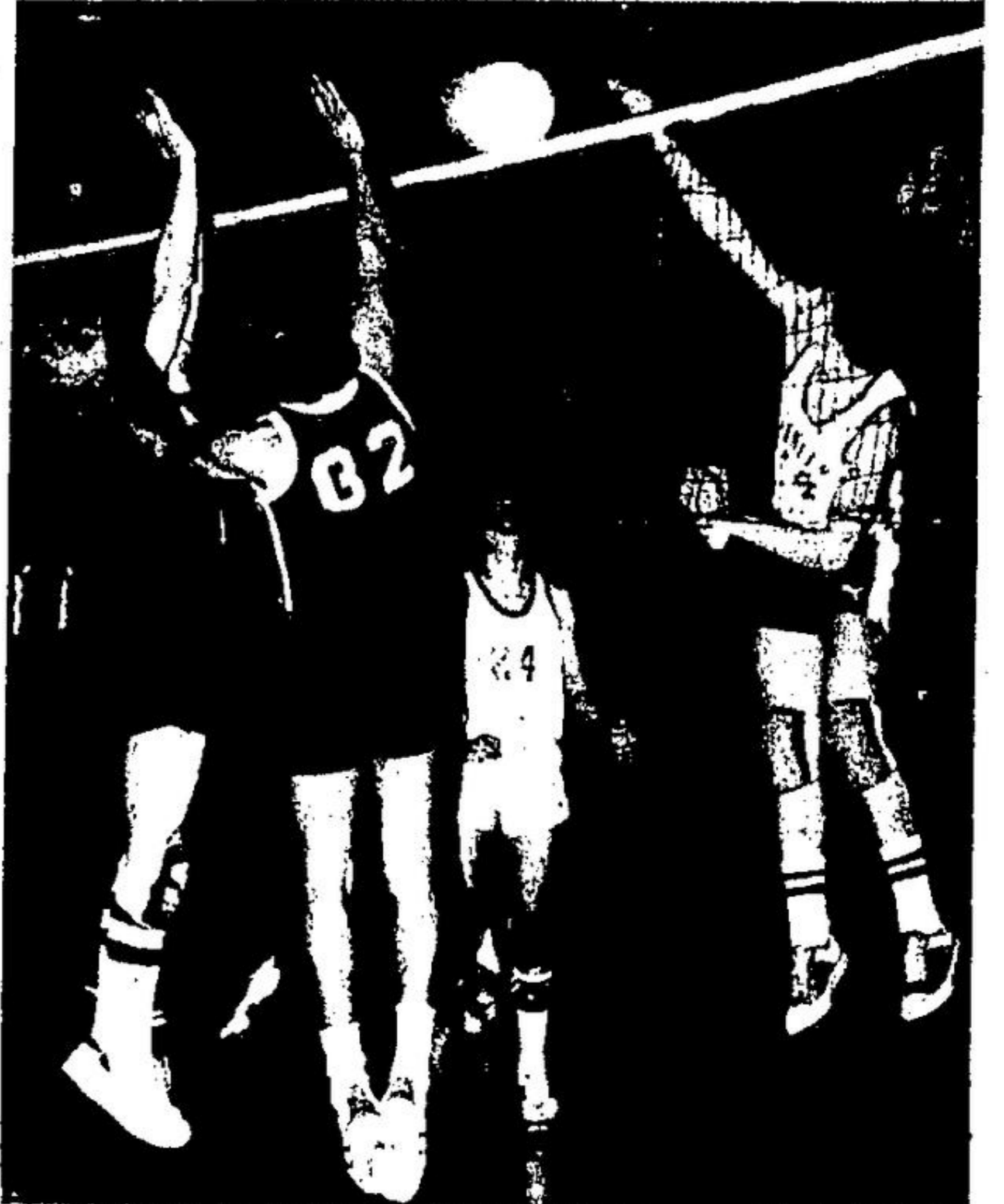
Crossman high scorer with eleven points
