



## Try a Mepps Spinner

PLEASE Please, please - do not show the world that outdoorsmen are slobs. Last year the litter at the popular fishing spots was beyond belief. I am the first to realize that Season Openers and the hot Salmon fishing brings out those who don't fish the rest of the season. Mainly, these are the ones that usually turn out to be the slobs. Discarded food and drink containers, snarled fishing line and dead fish are scattered anywhere and everywhere.

I for one don't like to spend my fishing time cleaning up after someone else, yet it happens everytime I go out. The Salmon are congregated at the mouths of the rivers now, in great numbers, and the early runs are up river. In the CREDIT RIVER they are at the dam in

NORVAL, the "VIADUCT" or railway bridge in Georgetown, and at the PAPER MILL DAM. Each place calls for a different type or method of fishing. A spawn bag anchored on bottom in the river mouth will take a great many fish, as will the common marshmallow, while it should be drifted while fishing upriver. Sometimes you will catch one of the many Trout,

either Rainbow or Brown that are becoming more plentiful

in the CREDIT RIVER as well as the other rivers in the

Keep a copy of the fishing regulations on hand and know the areas where the season is closed for trout. With the intermittent rain we have been having, the water condition could be almost anything from muddy to clear and you should fish accordingly. In deep holes (over five

teet) I use a number three MEPPS SPINNER in silver or gold, in medium holes (3-5 feet) a plug is used, and in runs of up to three feet I will use a small plug or spoon. If you remember that a "spinner rides down and a spoon rides up" it will help in your selection of a lure. In other words a spinner digs for bottom and a spoon planes to the sur-

If you should get yourself a fish, call me or the HERALD office and we would like to get a photograph and a little information on how and where, etc.

The Ministry of Environment has issued a bulletin on the mercury content of fish and this is available by writing to the ministry at QUEENS PARK, TORONTO. Mercury content increases in fish with increasing size, and this of course should be taken into account when eating fish from "contaminated" waters. The pamphlet entitled "Guide to eating Ontario Sportfish" will help along this line, and may be obtained from the local offices of the Ministry of Natural Resources.




