Eye cataracts in fish, Chatsworth Provincial Fish Hatchery closed down October 17 and 280,000 fingerling Splake had to be destroyed due to the Cataracts which lead to blindness. 400,000 unaffected fish will be stocked in Georgian Bay.

The Hatchery closure will give the Ministry time to dry out and disinfect the main hatchery to remove a bacteria that is causing an additional problem. The Chatsworth Hatchery will be ready for this fall's collection of disease free eggs, and the program will resume normally next year.

Fishing is still good to excellent at Port Credit and Bronte as well as other water front locations. Steve Smith of Mississauga had a nice 12.22 pound Coho that was 27 1/2 inches long. Julius Sturino of Toronto had a 10 pound and a 11 pound and two twelve pound Coho all taken on Orange Flatfish.

DAM-NORVAL. I understood the dam at Norval was out and the fish were getting up to the Paper Mill Dam at Georgetown, but others claim not. If anyone has seen or caught SALMON at the Georgetown Dam PLEASE TELL ME. I have not fished there myself and have been going on hearsay.

Unfortunately, Mr. Julian Reed claims to own the land on both sides of the river and dam at NORVAL as well as the dam itself. His assurance to me personally when he was building his "HYDRO GENERATOR" was the fish would have access to the upper river. His intention was to provide a "fish ladder" but as yet—no ladder—no access. If he has closed the dam there is no way the fish can come upriver. All for the saving of a few dollars on his Hydro bill, which would be negligible against the overall cost of producing Hydro in Ontario. An expensive recreation project of the Province of Ontario stalled at a private dam!!!

Have you ever considered the damage to our waterways from the dumping of road collected snow with its load of salt and calcium? This has bothered me for years and now someone is thinking along the right lines. Maybe this problem will not come up, but a seminar on STORM WATER MANAGEMENT will be held at Albion Hills Conservation Area on Nov. 18, 1977. Possibly some of these problems will be resolved.
