Graduation at old school

Even though Acton has a new high school with updated facilities to accommodate such occasions, the commencement exercises were held in the McKenzie-Smith auditorium Friday evening at the request of the graduating students.

Acton high school principal Dean Fink told the audience that the students had asked to have the ceremony in the old high school because of the memories it had for the gradu-

He noted that the first commencement exercises held in that auditorium were in 1959, the year the auditorium and four classrooms were added to the school. This would be the last commencement to be held in it, he sald, and invited those present to attend the new school's official opening on Nov. 29.

Valedictorian Dan Warren, who is currently studying at Ontario Bible School, gave the audience a taste of the fictitious announcements for which he earned his reputation as a prankster of note within the high school. Secondary School Honour Graduation diplomas went to 37 students while 97 students received their Secondary School Graduation diplomas.



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
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
