**137 homes planned around 18th hole**

A proposal that would combine a golf course with a residential subdivision was sent to the planner for a report on the concept of the proposal at the planning board last Tuesday.

Phil Weinstein and Andy Anderson propose to redesign the Georgetown Golf and Country Club course using land which they own on both sides of 17 Sideroad adjacent to the Tenth Line.

The course will consist of 18 holes and cross 17 Sideroad at the Tenth Line corner. At this point the men could not say whether they would build an underpass or an overpass to

get players from one side of the road to the other without interfering with traffic but said they would be open to suggestions on the point.

The developers will space 137 single family homes around 18th hole, 45 of them on acre lots and 92 on half acre lots, they said. The club house and existing trees would not be touched except for a few around one hole on the southern portion of the course. The homes would have municipal water but individual septic tanks and tile fields for sewage.

Mr. Weinstein told the board that a plan such as this is much more interesting for a developer to work out and would sell well because buyers would find a golf course in their back yard a more attractive prospect than other houses.

He suggested that the homes would be in the \$70,000 to \$100,000 price range.

He noted that from a planning point of view, it would make sense to ring Georgetown with this type of developments because it would stop adjacent areas from asking for municipal services and stop

the continuous spread of high-density development.

Asked if he foresaw a need for municipal transportation in the area further down the road, he said he did not. The need would not be sufficient to make it economically feasible, he said.

Mr. Anderson told the board he and his partner are prepared to run the course.

However, if the town wants to take it over as a municipal course they'd be open to that sort of arrangement too.

A similar plan was brought before the board 18 months ago but was turned down because it did not comply with the official plan, Mr. Weinstein said. Originally the plan called for the building of 190 homes on the site.
