### Region rejects welfare \$ hike

Ifalton social and family services administrator Rene Vivian would like to add \$40,000 to the 1978 general welfare assistance budget in anticipation of increasing unemployment.

"I think the country is in a hell of a mess," Mr. Vivian told the regional community and social services committee in seeking to justify his re-

He said more people would be hired next year, but higher unemployment is also indicat-

Originally, there was \$1,329,300 set aside in the budget for general assistance, and Mr. Vivian said he tried to keep gosts down in other sec-

Regional chairman Rie Morrow disagreed with the idea of putting more money into general assistance because it was available. He said he would like more evidence that the unemployment situation would worsen next year.

The committee decided not to recommend the additional money. The members agreed, however, that Mr. Vivian could make his own recommendation for the increase at the next meeling.
