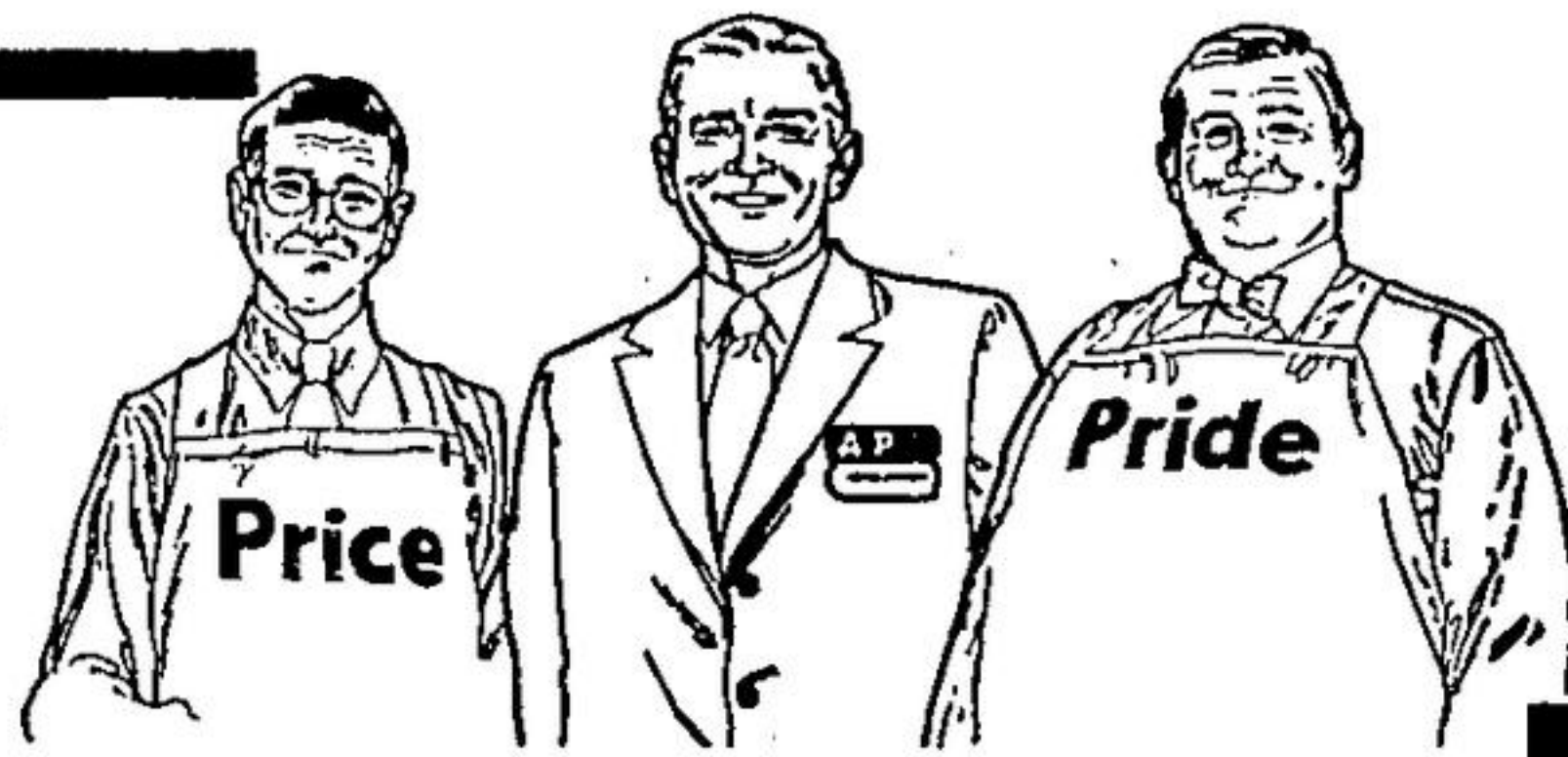

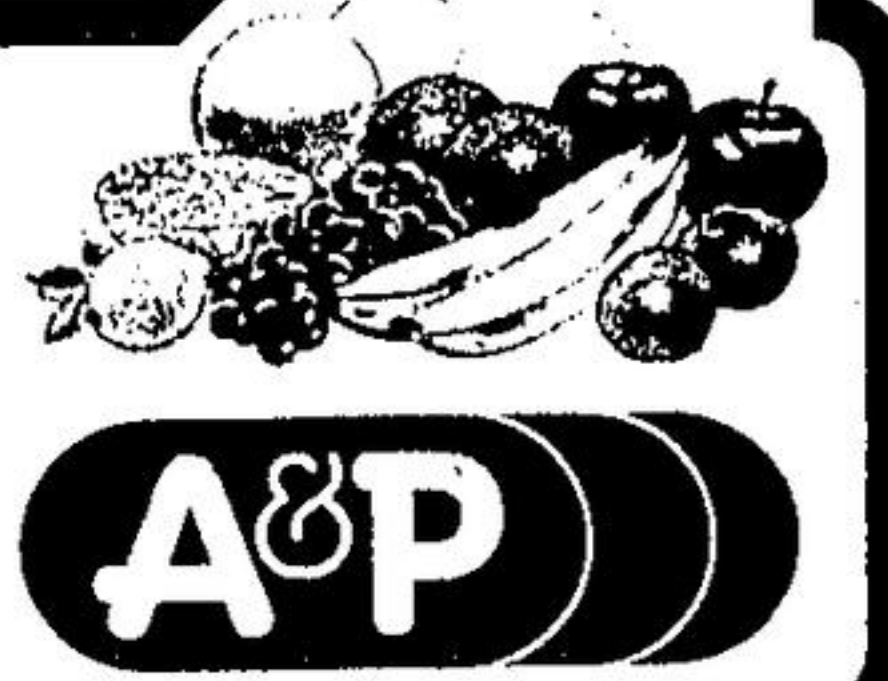

**Mad Show
 a success**

Nearly 300 people filled the Acton high school auditorium Thursday to witness the hilarious and often irreverent carry-on of a group of students who channelled their obvious creative talents into a unique offering entitled "The Mad Show".
 The show was named after Mad Magazine, the popular satirical periodical, but much of the featured material was drawn from the television's Monty Python's Flying Circus, as well as from the students' own clever imaginations.
 Nancy Clark directed the show's opening segment, which unabashedly plagiarized such classic Monty Python sketches as "The Pet Shop" and "Is This The Room For An Argument?".
 The students' own contributions to the scenes were clearly apparent, however, in the "typically British" characterizations and subtle ad libbing that brought extra humor to much of the parody.
 Featured in the Python cast were Egan Robinson, Jeff Goebels, Jackie Denny, Bonnie Caplan, Sheila Johnson, Simon Thwaites and Colin Mallet.
 The Mad Show segment itself was directed by Sue Mellor and Geoffrey Sansom and choreographed by Eva Sansom.

**Town hall
 designated
 historical**

Halton Hills council Monday decided to designate the old town hall in Acton as a historic building despite hearing arguments that the 97-year-old building be torn down to make a parking lot.
 Coun. Roy Booth said the old town hall is not a sound building and the cost of restoring it would be "astronomical" when land in the area is at a premium rate.
 Coun. Russ Miller supported Mr. Booth's contention that the building is in bad shape. He suggested that it be torn down to give more parking in downtown Acton and for the firefighters.
 Mayor Tom Hill, who voted in favor of designating the building as historic, feared that such a designation by bylaw might end up costing the entire town plenty of money if the citizens committee to save the building could not raise enough to renovate the building.
 He said the Ontario Heritage Foundation would match dollar for dollar the amount raised by the citizens, which to date is \$2,180.
 Coun. Garnet (Pat) McKenzie said that money is merely for a study and not renovations.
 Coun. Mike Armstrong said approving the resolution wouldn't cost the town any money now. He reminded council that it had given the citizens until Dec. 31 to come up with a scheme to save the building, failing which, council could rescind its resolution.
 Coun. Les Duby said that a 3,000 name petition in favor of keeping the town hall, the only historical building in Acton, should be supported. He noted, too, that the bylaw can be rescinded if the money can't be raised by the citizens.
