## Meal service expands to Acton

The new Acton Meals on Wheels program will be joining with the existing Georgetown program to provide hot noon meals to those unable to cook for themselves.

The new program will begin on Nov. 14 and Georgetown residents who have been receiving meals from the

Georgetown program may notice a difference in price. All meals will now cost \$1.25 in Acton and in Georgetown, with delivery on a five-day-a-week basis.

Meals are now being provided by the dietary staff at Halton Centennial Manor, Don Grein, owner of Reliable Taxi Service in Acton, has volunteered to pick up the meals from the Manor and drop them at Knox Church, Georgetown and at the Community Services Centre in Acton.

Volunteers in each area will sort and deliver the meals from those central points. Meal on Wheels are available only to those who are too ill, too physically disabled, or for some other reason unable to cook for themselves. Applicants to the program are screened by a nurse to confirm that they are qualified to receive the service. An important part of the program is assisting independence, thus

making it easier for senior citizens to live at home, and in some cases reducing the need for homemaker services.

At a recent press conference, the Meals on Wheels Board expressed gratitude to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, which has prepared the meals for the Georgetown area program for the past two years, but was unable this year to meet the increased demand.

The board also thanked volunteers who had helped the program in the past and issued a welcome to volunteers who will be involved as of Nov. 14.

## Finance problems in day care budget

Day care facilities in Halton are faced with serious financial problems due to a drop in projected revenues.

Two regional day care centres in Oakville are faced with a drop of over 50 per cent in the revenues projected by staff for this year.

Staff had predicted revenues of \$95,037 but they received only \$44,775.

Because there has been an increase in the number of subsidized users of private day care centres, it will take an additional \$32,000 to keep 118 Milton and Burlington residents in the program.

The operating costs of the two Oakville day care centres have been within budget projections. Rene Vivian, administrator of the family and social services department said that 1977 budget figures were based on revenues that never came. An increasing number of people using day care services had to be subsidized, resulting in less revenue.

An increasing number of day care users are single-parent families which can't afford to pay for the program, according to day care co-ordinator Norma Lepa.

Recently there has also been a fluctuation in enrollment. Among the proposals to alleviate the problem is the addition of half-day care. It has also been suggested that criteria for eligibility for assistance should be reviewed, in order to encourage more clients. This has been tried, with success, in Halton Hills.

The deficits from both the Oakville day care centres and the private day care centres will be paid from the general assistance account.


