Raiders give up big lead Fort Erie earns 4-4 tie

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders blew a three goal lead as the Fort Erie Mavericks came back to earn a 4-4 draw in intermediate "A" action here last Friday night.

The game went into overtime but neither side was able to notch a clincher.

The Mavericks tied the score with only 3:14 left in regulation time.

The home side took a 2-0 lead in the game on goals by Ray Evans and Andre Nolet. Evans' goal came with a Maverick serving time. Assist on the play went to Doug Tate and John Boyce. Bob Elnesky drew an assist on Nolet's goal.

Pat Flynn replied for the Mavericks to make the first period score 2-1. His goal came with the Raiders' Bob Fotheringham serving a delay-of-game penalty levied against

goaltender Mario MacDonald.

The Raiders came out flying in the middle frame and looked invincible in building their lead to 4-1 by the 12:50 mark. The Raiders outshot the Mavericks 11-3 in the period. However, the Mavericks made two of their shots count as they cut the lead to 4-3 before the period ended.

Fotheringham scored the first Raider goal on a setup from Tate. Nolet then scored his second goal of the game with Larry Peterson earning an assist on the play.

The Mavericks then got goals from Albert Opatovsky and Danny Blair. Blair's goal came with the Raiders' Boyce off for elbowing.

The Raiders controlled the play for most of the final period but were unable to capitalize on any of their chances. Again they outshot

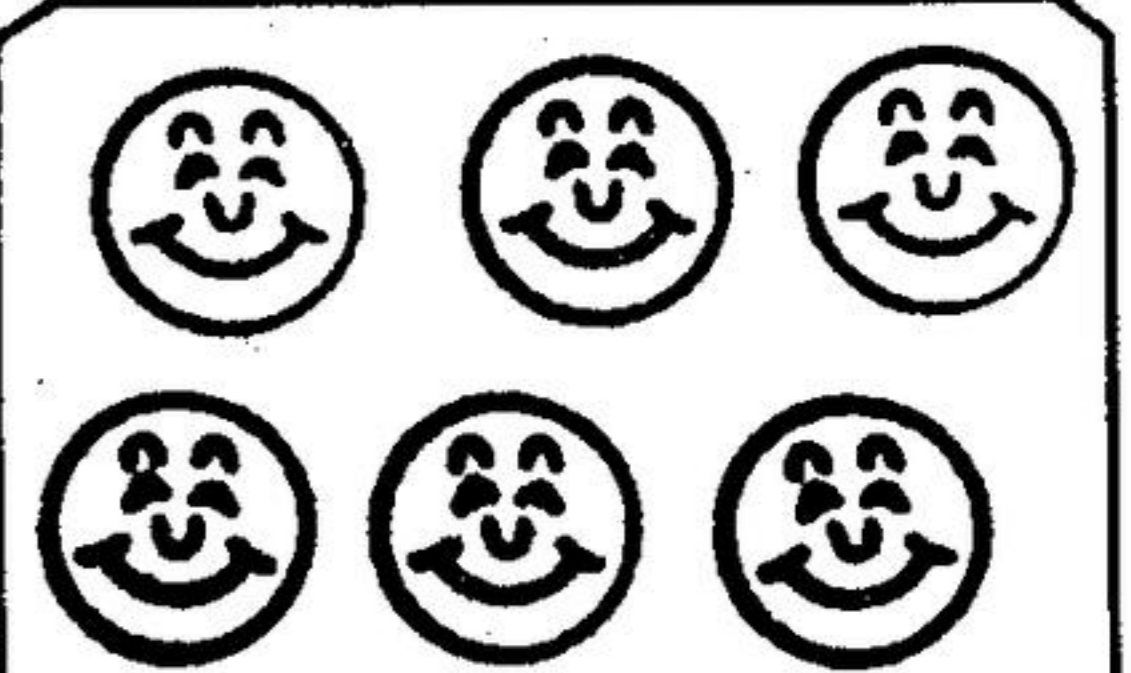


the Mavericks by a 8-5 margin.

The two teams played defensively in the overtime period with the Raiders managing to get four shots on net and the Mavericks three.

A win in the game would have given the Raiders a 500 record and they should have won as they outplayed the Mavericks. Goaltender MacDonald was sharp in the first period when he had 12 shots fired his way. However, he had only 11 shots to handle the rest of the way and three of them went for goals.

The turning point in the game for the Mavericks came when they replaced starting goaltender Myles Bosnak with John Dick. The change was made midway through the second period with the Raiders winning 4-1. The Raiders had 15 shots on Bosnak and fired 16 more at Dick.



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Tired and injured Gems fall prey to Brampton

A limping and fatigued Georgetown Gemini team dropped a 7-4 decision to the Brampton team on Sunday night. It was the Gems fourth game in five nights.

General manager Bob Tost said that all but two or three Gems are hurting. "A lot of the guys are playing with injuries which makes it impossible for them to perform to their potentials," he said.

enjoying a manpower advantage.

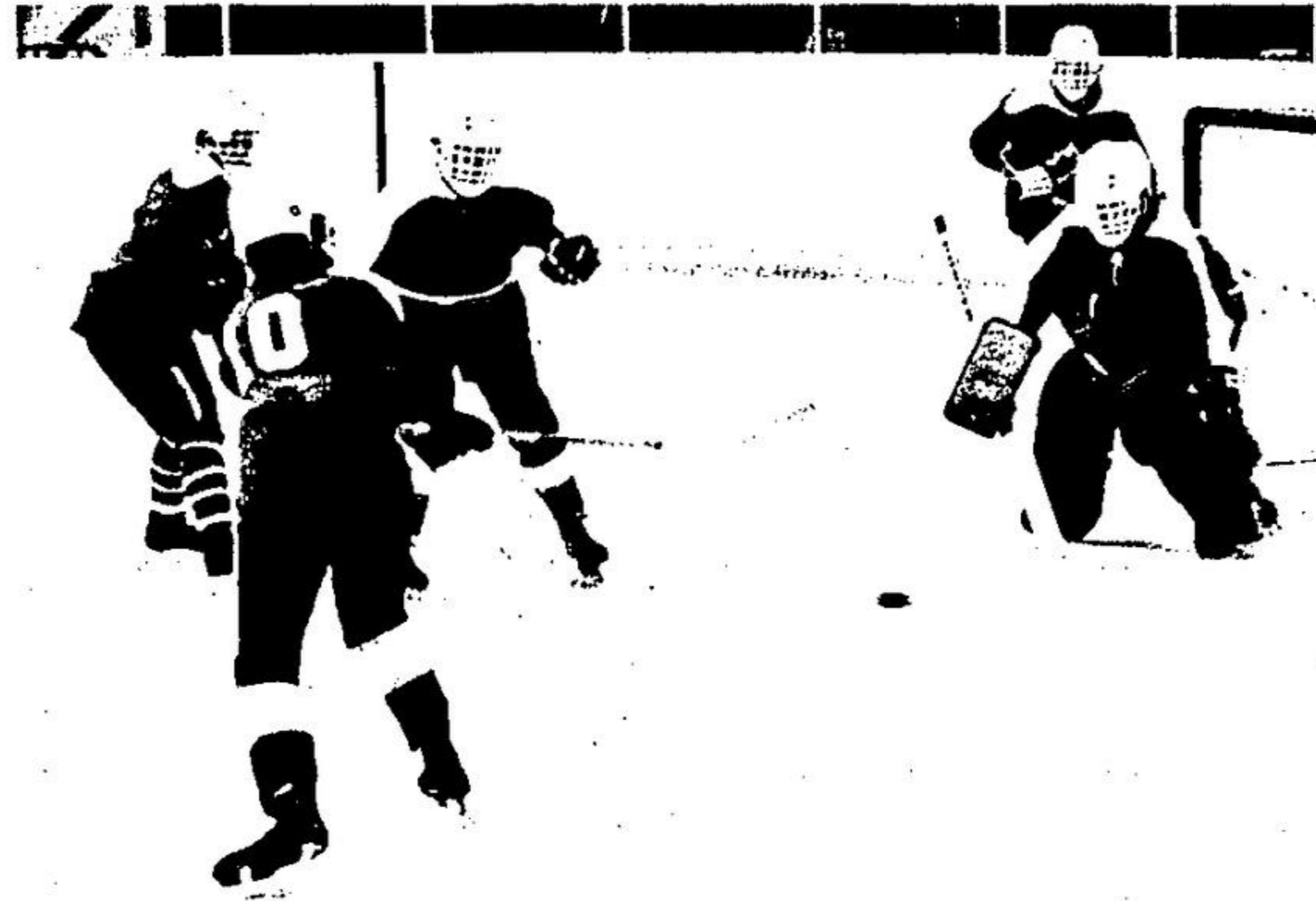

Penalties finally proved to be the Gems' undoing as Brampton scored three third period power play goals to put the game out of reach. The goals were scored by Paul Cook, Dave Lowcock and Peters.

The Gems were penalized 18 times for minor infractions. Joe South was also given two 10-minute misconducts. Brampton received 12 minors and one fighting major.

The Gems fired two power play goals of their own in the final period. Joe South got the first one and Milne finished off the Gems' scoring. Brampton's Rob Campbell scored the final goal of the game in the final minute.

Fish at NORVAL

Still no report of the salmon getting above the DAM yet, although they may be in small numbers. The number of fish below the Ited Dam would tend to prove that they can not negotiate the height of the dam, and are schooling in the deep holes below the bridge and down stream. I have seen a lot of fish taken there and not one above the dam. That is a personal observation, but anyone I have spoken to has not seen fish above the dam.

I noticed a picture in another paper showing a rainbow trout. The fish was APPARENTLY released. THIS FISH WILL DIE.

Anyone catching a Rainbow Trout in the Credit OR any other River near here must release it. If you hold the fish by the gills, the fish will die. You can be charged with killing an illegal fish if caught. DO NOT PUT FINGERS OR HANDS IN THE GILL AREA OF A FISH TO BE RELEASED.

Remove the hook while the fish is still in the water and let it go immediately, and if you want to photograph the fish make it quick.

It is a shame to see such a nice fish wasted due to mishandling. Learn how to release a fish correctly and it will surely survive.
