The win was a very important one for the Gems. Brampton is one of the teams that the Gems are chasing. It also put Georgetown back on the winning track after suffering a 7-4 loss in its last outing which was also against Brampton.

The Gems came out of the game with two points but the team is still taking too many unnecessary penalties. Among its 25 minutes were Eutenier's misconduct, two roughing penalties, one elbowing call and an interference infraction.

The short answer to question 3 is yes there will be soccer in 1978. Next year the organization will be different for certain. I will not dwell yet again on the problems of this and previous years, they have been well aired all year and by now everyone should be aware.

As I see it we have a small number of enthusiasts who are first anxious to retain their enthusiasm; who are concerned at the previous hassles which act against the interest of the youngsters; who are concerned at the thin spreading of their resources and therefore not giving their best; who are concerned by the soccer potential in this area going to waste and not being given attention. These enthusiasts will probably get together to form their own soccer club within rigid guidelines, of parental-adult participation, for example they will no doubt restrict membership of players to the number which can be properly and fully handled at all levels, (adminstrating, financing, coaching, managing and refereeing, and parental participation). Some have already formed the initial stages of such a club and I welcome the move. I may add that the 1977 executive has been kept fully informed of the stages of formation. Basically this organization is going to inter-district soccer at rural (the old immediately near town set up of Pineview, Acton, Milton etc.) and Halton and Peel levels. Personally I hope to be part of that set up. I would not like to see a restriction of soccer. There is no reason why soccer could not continue with as many numbers playing next year as this year.

However, that situation depends to a great extent on more parents becoming involved. I see the separation of house league and rep into separate entities. Hopefully working to-

Ontario Outdoors

NEW HOPE FOR THE OTTAWA RIVER

The master plan for Carillon Provincial Park has been released, and was developed through the co-operation of the federal government under the agricultural rehabilitation and development act.

It is bounded by Highway 17 and the Ottawa River and is within an hours' drive of Montreal, Ottawa, and the United States border.

Maybe now the pollution of the Ottawa River will cease. I have been asked recently about the term "Floodplain" used by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. The floodplain is the space on either side of the river or any watercourse which is susceptible to flooding. Building, filling, or altering watercourses on floodplains are regulated by the CVCA "an appreciation of trees, plants and clean water sometimes has to be learned and access must be preserved in our ever-growing, polluted and noisy world."

The addition of a zero in last weeks column made 200 members added to the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters into 2,000.

Julian Reed of NORVAL, the owner of the Norval Dam across from Credit River Boats, told me last week "there are three issues in regards to the dam — Fish, private property and energy."

The fish are stalled at the dam, and back off to the large pool by the bridge.

PRIVATE PROPERTY the dam and the land on both sides of the river is private as is the land on both sides of the river all the way to the highway bridge. No one has asked permission to fish the dam, and I don't think anyone will, as the Reed driveway is well posted and as yet Mr. Reed has not prosecuted anyone for trespassing, although he has the right.

One point that came out in my discussion with Mr. Reed is that the Credit River above Dundas is classed as "Non-Navigable". Also Julian "owns the river bed." To avoid any and all problems, fish only below the old road bridge and don't destroy or litter.

Otherwise permission to fish that area will also be withdrawn.



PLEASE REMEMBER, Rainbow Trout season is closed here. Eric Hancock of Murdock Street, Georgetown has caught several good sized Rainbow Trout in Norval, and has been careful in releasing them.

Nov. 6, I was at the whirpool taking photographs and gently suggested to a couple of fishermen that they stop trying to snag salmon, before they are arrested. They decided they would rather pick a fight with me and take their chances with the law.

They had obviously been drinking, and were a confirmation of Julian Reed's feelings of these so-called sportsmen. If the Salmon Run does this to people, I hope they stop the stocking and discontinue the program.

That is not an example of the behaviour I like to see in ONTARIO OUTDOORS.
