Lice warbles discussed

Lice, warbles and internal parasites were the topics of discussion at a Beef Information Meeting held Nov. 5 at Lee Wilkinson's Farm. R.R.3 Georgetown.

Dick Levick from Cyanamid introduced a film clip on animal health. Mr. Levick emphasized that beef producers should be reducing dollar losses due to slow weight gain, unthriftiness and damaged hides caused by parasites.

There are products such as Tramisol available in injectable form to control nine major types of worms.

Neil Campbell of Starbar displayed hides which had been infested with warbles. In the past year warbles have accounted for \$2 million damage to beef carcasses and

Mr. Campbell demonstrated the proper method of applying Grubex to the animals back. It is important to wear rubber gloves to avoid chemical reaction.

A healthy animal may be treated for warbles and wormed at the same time. It is important to read all lables for best results.

O.M.A.F. Beef Specialist Doug Dickie covered a number of areas of interest. Rumensin is now available for use by beef producers. This is a feed additive allowing less feed to be consumed per pound of gain.

It is not a growth promotant. Rumensin is most effective with high energy rations such as corn silage. It is not to be fed to other types of livestock. A number of growth promotants are available on the market. These products are available as car implants. Expected gains range from 5 to 15 per cent depending on age and level of feed.

The phone company has an annoyance call specialist, Bill Salmon, manager of the Acton exchange, told The Herald Monday.

Mr. Salmon was touthe to tell The Herald just what steps the telephone company takes in tracking down annoyance vallers but said that each case is handled on an individual basis.

Telephone customers should record the time they receive annoyance calls and what the person on the other end says. If the calls are serious enough. the police may be involved in the investigation, he said.
