The junior and senior boys' basketball teams of Georgetown district high school have begun practicing for the coming season and the two teams are looking very unlike one another.

The senior team finished second in all of Ontario last year and a number of its players graduated. Head coach Bob Auld said three of the players from last year will be returning for the semester which begins in January and are expected to join the team. The seniors are currently carrying three players of junior age on the roster.

"We have basically a new team this year," Auld said. "We do have some fine players who played junior last year and they should help us."

The regular season does not begin until January so the seniors and juniors will be playing tournaments and exhibition games until then. Some of the schools which the Rebels will be playing are of the very best calibre. Included are three of the top Toronto schools: Oakwood, St.

Mike's and Jarvis.

Junior head coach Moe Leeking said last year was a rebuilding year for his team. The Rebels finished 4-4 last year in league play.

"We have five guys returning from last year and some excellent players from our feeder schools," Leeking said. The Rebel's feeder schools are Centennial, Holy Cross and Stewarttown.

Unlike the seniors, the juniors are going with a tall lineup. Steve Keslick, who will be playing centre is 6-6 and he two forwards will be 6-3.

The junior team began its preseason schedule last Tuesday by bombing Acton 52-34. John Karolidis and Mark Welstrop led the way by scoring 10 points each while Keslick had 8 and Kevin Neale seven.

Both teams host the teams from Jarvis Collegiate this Friday in what promises to be very competitive and exciting games.
