## Norval News

Herald correspondent The tender from Accucon Ltd., of Thornhill for installing water mains in Norval to bring water from Georgetown has been approved by the Halton Regional government at a cost of \$328,436.50 to be completed in 100 working days.

Total cost of the project including the cost of a standpipe at the top of the hill will be approximately \$508,000 which is \$2000 less than the amount budgeted for the project. Plastic pipe will be used. The road allowance that will be disturbed during the work will be restored by the contractors.

Workers are already drilling test holes in the soil and surveying where the pipes will go. Our councillor Pat Patterson expects that work on the mains will commence in three or four weeks. Russell Miller reports that the only approval not received as yet is from the Dept. of Highways, all others have been received and he is hopeful that water for Norval will be a reality soon.

The firm of Proctor and Redfern, who did the original survey, are determining the cost for each home owner. This report should be completed

It really looks as If water from Georgetown will at long last be in Norval taps by late spring or early summer.

The fight for water has gone on for so many years that the many people of the village and on council who worked so hard to make it a reality and became so frustrated with all the red tape and no action from one department to another find it is hard to believe that finally the project has been approved.
