### BLACK CREEK CHRISTMAS

TORONTO—The Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority invites you to enjoy preparations for Christmas, pre-Confederation style, in Black Creek Pioneer Village.

From November 26th to January 2nd, the Village staff demonstrate how settlers prepared and observed the Yule. The Village houses display the simple decorations of the period - wreaths of evergreen boughs, garlands of cranberries and popcorn and the traditional kissing balls. The kitchens are filled with the aromas of freshly baked fancy breads, cakes, mince and puddings.

To add to the Christmas scene at Black Creek, the choir members from St. Philip's Lutheran Church in Islington will sing Christmas carols in various locations through the Village, each Saturday and Sunday afternoon, between 2 and 4 p.m., up to December 18th.

Something new has been added to the Village Christmas. While touring Black Creek on weekends, between November 26th, and December 24th, and daily from December 26th to 31st, visitors should be sure to take wagon ride to the Dalziel Barn, which houses the Percy Band Toy Collection, the largest collection of 19th century toys in Canada. Also, Santa Claus has set up his workshop in the Dalziel Barn and welcomes young visitors to help him. Another attraction for the children will be a "Santa's Mailbox."

Santa and the toy collection may be visited on weekends, between November 26th and December 24th, from 10 - 4:30 p.m. and daily from December 26th to 31st from 9:30 - 4:00 p.m.

The Village is open weekdays from 9:30 to 4 p.m. and on weekends from 10:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. It will be closed Christmas Day and New Year's Day only.

Black Creek Pioneer Village, located at Jane Street and Steeles Avenue, in northwest Toronto, is administered by the Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

# Raiders lose one-goal game team having trouble at Alcott

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders are having trouble winning at home. On Friday they dropped another one-goal decision as they lost 3-2 to Thorold at Alcott Arena.

The Raiders slightly outplayed Thorold, but this time it was a hot goaltender that stopped Georgetown from gaining a home victory. The loss left the Raiders with a 6-7-1 mark and out of the first place in the O.H.A. Intermediate "A" league.

The home side came out flying in the opening period and completely outplayed their opponents. However, Bill Cheropita in the Thorold net thwarted the Raider shooters time after time and his team skated off with 1-0 lead. The shots in the first period were 13-7 in favor of Georgetown.

The only goal of the period came with only 19 seconds remaining and was scored by Howie Doan.

The Raiders tied the score at the 6:20 mark of the middle period on a power play effort.

Tom Daley was the scorer with assists going to Ray Evans and Steve Blundy.

Daley then put the Raiders ahead for the only time in the game with his second goal at the 10:53 mark. An assist on the play went to Evans.

The Raider lead was short lived as Thorold tied it up at less than two minutes later on a goal by Glen Craig. The visitors went ahead at 14:47 on Gino Farinacci's goal.

The Raiders could not score as Cheropita kept them at bay. The final shots on net were 31-28 in favor of Georgetown.

The Raiders played an unusually chippy game for them. The team took a total of 29 minutes in penalties as opposed to 14 for Thorold.

Bob Fotheringham picked up 17 of those minutes in the third period when he was ruled the aggressor in an altercation with Thorold's Mike Purcer. Fotheringham got five minutes for fighting, an automatic two minute penalty and a 10-minute misconduct. Purcer received only two minute roughing penalty for his part in the altercation.

## Raiders protest loss

Jack Handy, general manager of Raiders, said Ron Anderson, who was wearing number five and playing defense for Thorold, had not received his release from the Brantford Alexanders of O.H.A. Senior "A" league.

The Thorold general manager has until 8 p.m. tonight to put up a defense. Registering a protest or defending one costs a club \$100. The team that wins the protest receives their money back.

Handy said if his protest goes through it will be up to the O.H.A. officials to make a decision on whether to award Georgetown two points or play the game over.
