

Jaycee directory covers whole town

Georgetown Jaycee's directory for 1978 will cover all of Halton Hills and be built around a historical theme covering the entire municipality, says a club spokesman.

Gary Scott, in charge of organizing the project, says that John McDonald will be writing the story line and providing the pictures for a look at Halton Hills from its early days 100 years ago to its amalgamation under regional government.

John's story will concentrate on how the area was settled and why businesses moved from place to place, he says.

This will be the first directory to cover both Acton and Georgetown, Mr. Scott says. Although the idea of including both towns was mentioned for the last directory nothing was done about it at that time.

Mr. Scott says members of the organization will be out calling on all businessmen and professional people in the municipality during the coming weeks and when the directory arrives on local doorsteps next spring it will contain facts on local clubs and organizations, a professional directory, and information on the people and services available to residents.

Mr. Scott expects the directory to be ready "around the time of the Crazy Boat Race" in April. It will be distributed free door-to-door just as it has been in the past, he says.

The Greatest Gift

In the Bible's Old Testament, the prophet Isaiah wrote of Him: "His name shall be called - Wonderful, Counselor, THE Mighty God, THE Everlasting Father, THE Prince of Peace." From His obscure birth (which we shall soon be celebrating), thru His subsequent life to His consequent death and resurrection. He gave to ALL mankind His new well-earned titles "Savior, Sanctifier, Healer, Glorious Lord and Coming King" He, like the prophet Isaiah once stood before the sovereign Creator, God the Father, when asked "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? To preach good tidings to the meek - to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captive - to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord and the day of vengeance of our God - to comfort all that mourn - Then said I 'Here am I, send me'."

For all of this expense of effort He was abandoned by everyone before the full force of authority - condemned without proper legal counsel and sentenced to die for no crime or breach of conduct. He was nailed ignominiously to rough lumber and lifted up on that cross of timbers to die in utter humiliation and degradation so that it might be said of Him "surely He has borne OUR sorrows - He was wounded for OUR transgressions. He was bruised for OUR iniquities, for chastisement of OUR peace was upon Him."

In His death and resurrection, He became the Chief mediator between God and mankind - Satan and sin the still very much a reality and force today - no longer have full dominion over the Earth - so that a contemporary writing of this very important fact could say with absolute authority "O death where is your sting? O grave where is your victory? For the sting of death is sin - but thanks be to God, Who gives us the victory thru Him."

Thus summed, one could say "For God so loved the Earth that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. Main Street plan gets nod

Approval in principle was given by planning board to a proposal to put 12 single-family homes on 15.5 acres on the west side of Main Street south, Georgetown on the edge of town. The development planned by Southfield Holdings Ltd. will require an official plan amendment and a public meeting because it is now zoned open space.

The homes are designed around a cul-de-sac in a clearing about 500 feet back from Main Street. The property is bounded by Valleyview Road, the North Halton Golf and Country Club, the Black Creek, and Main Street south.

The recreation department has asked for a fitness trail to be installed in land designated as open space between the homes and the creek bank rather than a cash contribution to recreation facilities.

Church supports India relief

Mountainview Baptist Church is making a special appeal for funds to help in disaster relief in India after cyclones which struck Nov. 21.

The area in which the cyclones struck is one in which Canadian Baptist missionaries are heavily involved. The southeast coast of India was struck by three cyclones, and tidal wave action and eighteen inches of rainfall caused additional destruction. The death toll is expected to be in the tens of thousands.

Because most of the dead are in the "untouchable" class, people are unwilling to bury them. The threat of cholera is grave, according to a news bulletin received from Mountainview Baptist Church. In addition, the rice crop may have suffered long term damage as a result of salt water contamination.

Acton firehall expands over holiday season

The addition of a second story to the Acton firehall on Bower Avenue is close to completion despite a series of minor problems and disagreements that had at times threatened to seriously delay the project.

A and M Ellis Ltd, the Thornhill construction firm to which town council awarded the tender for the extension Sept. 7, will continue working on the building through the Christmas season. The addition of a second floor, necessitated by the purchase of new fire fighting equipment by the town, is expected to cost more than \$187,000.

Council's original tender of \$184,368 for the renovations had to be revised last month when engineers agreed that steel support beams would have to be installed instead of the pillars originally called for in the plans.

Consulting engineer Allan Zeegen was also granted a \$3,000 contingency fund last month, which is designed to expedite the project by covering unforeseen costs without council having to first approve their payment.

Council has not yet announced any plans to provide special parking spaces for the exclusive use of the volunteer firefighters. The lack of parking was the volunteer's prime concern when plans for the firehall extension were being discussed last summer. The problem, in fact, prompted the firefighters to reject an initial proposal for renovations and instead request a new firehall location where parking space would be guaranteed.

In accepting the Ellis tender for the project, council vowed to provide sufficient parking

for the men.

The problem faced an additional obstacle last month when the citizens committee currently engaged in assessing the feasibility of restoring Acton's former town hall, located adjacent to the firehall, registered a complaint to council over the work done thus far on the firehall.

Doug Fread, the vice chairman of the "Save the Town Hall committee" reminded council that special consideration was to have been given to a proposal to match the brickwork and design of the firehall extension with that of the town hall, Mr. Fread was informed that cement blocks were being used for the firehall because matching brickwork would have cost an additional \$6,000.

Mr. Fread commented, however, that his committee may have been able to provide the extra funds through a public grant similar to those anticipated to cover the cost of a feasibility study on the town hall restoration.
