Raiders win at Alcott rout Port Colborne 9-2

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders finally put things together at Alcott Arena as they defeated the Port Colborne Sailors 9-2 in O.H.A. Intermediate "A" action Friday night.

Tom Daley, who was chosen Raider Player of the Month for November, led the way by scoring two goals and adding two assists. The Raiders totally dominated the game and had a 9-0 lead before the visitors hit the scoresheet.

Ray Evans opened the scoring at the 5:29 mark of the opening period and Tom Gilbert and Daley made the score 3-0 before the period was out. Evan's and Daley's goals were power play efforts and Gilbert tallied while the Raiders were playing one-man short.

The Sailors took seven minor penalties in that first period and the Raiders, who took only three, made them pay the price. Gilbert scored his second goal of the evening to open the scoring in the second period. Twenty-one seconds later Steve Blundy got into the scoring act to make the score 5-0. Daley and Bob Elinesty also scored in the middle frame. Daley's was a power play effort.

Bob Foltheringham and Art Webster scored early third period goals as the Raiders juked the score up to 9-0. Mario MacDonald's shutout bid was ruined by Mike Soucie who tallied with six and a half

minutes left in the game. Tim Martel made the score 9-2 with a goal in the final minute.

MacDonald had only 19 shots to handle as his teammates had things well under control in front of him.

Webster and Sailor tough guy Dan DeGazio received five-minute fighting majors with only 15 seconds left in the game. Webster was setting the score with DeGazio who had taken cheap shots at a few of the Raiders.

Juri Kudrasovs, Tate, Blundy, Webster as well as Daley each earned two assists apiece.

Canadian Tire money will buy tots and students Raider seats

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders have announced a new ticket promotion which they hope will benefit them as well as minor hockey in town.

Trevor Moores, who is the head of the public relations for the Raiders, announced the plan last Tuesday. Beginning on December 9, and including every regular home date the Raiders play to the end of the season, children and students will be able to use Canadian Tire money to get into the games. The admission charge for students is \$1.25 and for children .75 cents.

Twenty-five per cent of proceeds will be shared 50-50 by the Georgetown Minor Hockey Association and the support group.

In announcing the new plan Mr. Moores said the Raiders are undertaking the project because they feel they have an obligation to minor hockey in Georgetown.

"We do not have hard figures to say how much we will give to the two groups through the promotion," Mr. Moores said. The amount will obviously depend on how many students and children take advantage of the promotion.

Mr. Moores was quick to point out that the offer will only stand for regular season games. That means that students and children will not be able to take advantage of it for the exhibition game against the Yugoslavian National team or any playoff

games the Raiders may be involved in. Murray Lawton, owner of the Canadian Tire store in Georgetown, and Don McRae and Barry Whitworth, co-owners of the Chrysler dealership, were also on hand for the announcement.

The Raiders also unveiled a new T-shirt they will be marketing. The T-shirt, which has the Raider ensignia, will be available at the Chrysler dealership and Canadian Tire.

The Raiders have also received David Lyons Memorial trophy. The trophy, named for the late service manager of Chrysler, will go to the most improved Raider of the year. Mr. Lyons died this past autumn in an automobile accident and he was a long-time supporter of the Raiders and of minor hockey in the area.

The Raiders scored one of their goals while Pionteck was off. The Geminis' new coach Ron Dixon was successful in cutting down his team's penalties for his first two games against Dixie and Oakville. However, his team reverted back to their old style and took 46 minutes against Streetsville and received two game misconducts. The Derby players were no angels either as they took 40 minutes.

The Geminis do have some excellent players, such as Chris Milne, Paul Ancinelli, Doug Barnes and others, who are interested in playing hockey, but the majority of the players are more concerned with roughing up opponents than defeating them on the

scoreboard. The Derbys took a 2-0 lead by the 10-minute mark of the opening period. The first goal came with Geminis' captain Terry Turner in the penalty box.

Doug Barnes brought the Geminis to within one goal at the 14:10 mark but the Derby's restored their two-goal lead two minutes later. Frank Pionteck made the score 3-2 before the period was out.

Georgetown suffered a crushing blow at the end of the opening period. Barnes was thrown out of the game as he received a major misconduct. Barnes is one player the Geminis cannot afford to lose if they are to be competitive.

Brad Miller faced 30 shots in the Gemini net while the Geminis managed to get 26 shots on the Streetsville net.

Milne played another strong game as he earned assists on all three Gem goals.

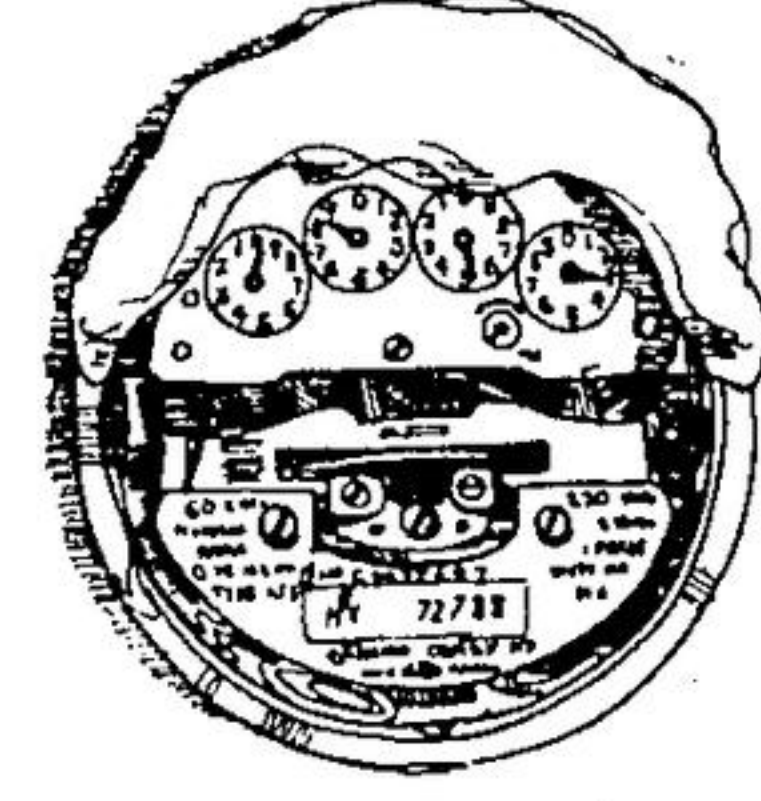
