Flyers beat Sabres in Acton red-hot goaltender the key

The Acton Sabres travelled to Milton on Sunday and were dumped 4-1 by the Flyers.

The two goaltenders, Ian Roberts of the Flyers and Robin Incoe of the Sabres, played exceptionally well in the opening period as there was only one goal scored.

Paul McCann of the Flyers opened the scoring at the 14:12 mark of the period. The Sabres were all over the Flyers and did everything but score. Roberts stopped the 16 shots that were fired at him.

In the second period it was

Incoe's turn to shine. The Milton shooters blasted 15 shots his way but only one found its way past him. It was a power play goal scored by Gasper Paul. Roberts stopped the seven shots he had to handle in the period.

The Flyers opened their lead

to 3-0 at the 5:52 mark of the final period. Paul Martin was the sharpshooter. It was also a power play effort.

With 1:01 left in the game Rod Gooding made it 4-0 and it appeared Roberts had the shutout in the bag.

The Sabres, who were shut-out in their last outing against Brampton Chevys Logans, finally hit the scoreboard with only 45 seconds left in the

game. John Brunl, from Doug Elliott and Mark Schindel, was the Sabre marksman.

The Sabres could not take advantage of the Flyers' penalties. They had five more power play opportunities than the home team, but were outscored 2-1.

Sabres shutout in Brampton Chapman held scoreless

The back breaker for the Sabres came at the 17:18 mark. Cook decided he had set up enough goals and decided to score one himself. His marker

came with his team playing a man short.

It was a chippy game with the two teams taking 22 minor penalties. Twelve of the infractions were called against Brampton.

Combine second mixture with first, and mix well. Line loaf tin with wax paper. Top with 1/2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup butter, 1/2 tsp. flour. Nuts, raisins, cherries if desired. BAKE at 375 for 35-40 minutes.

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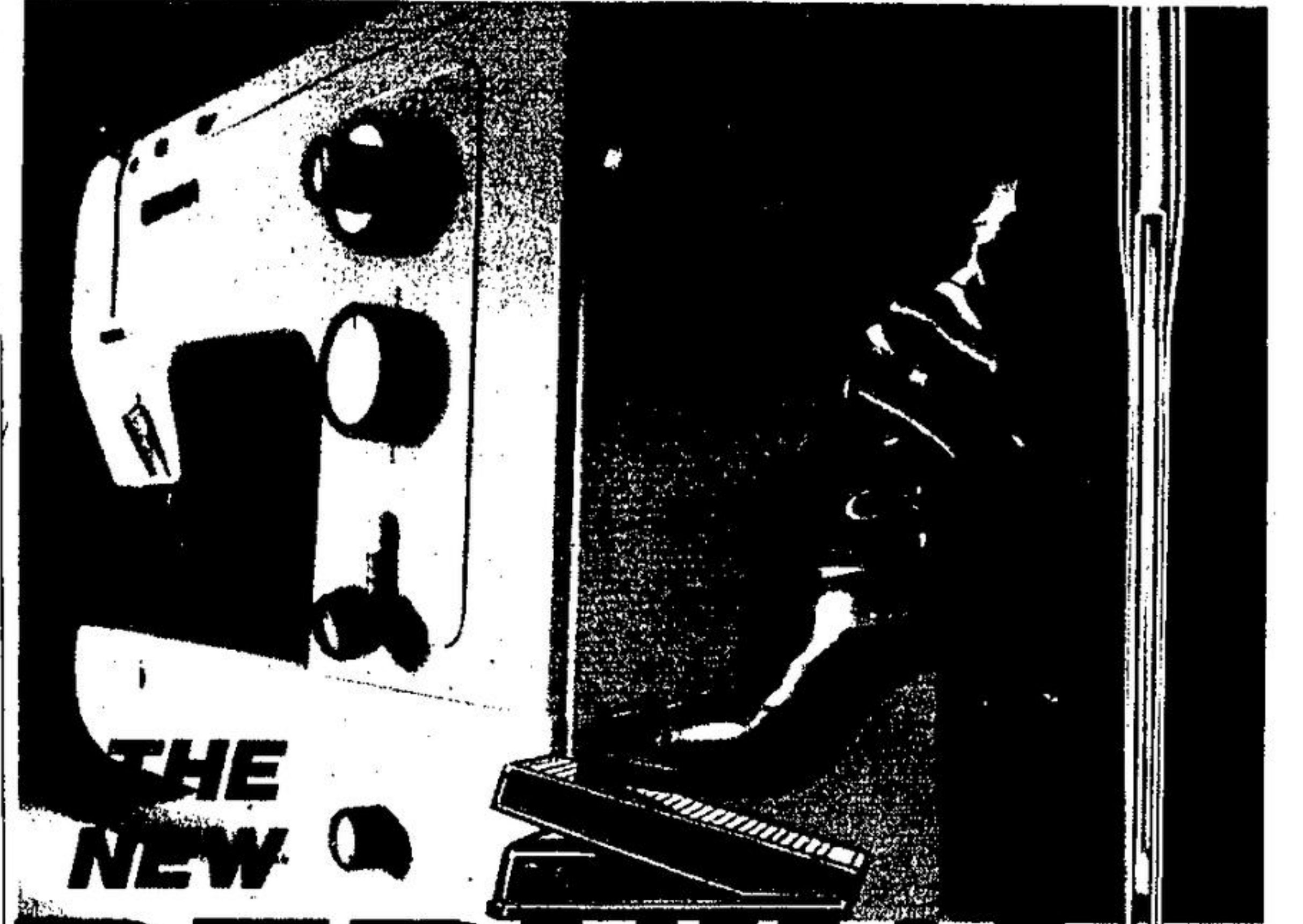
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
