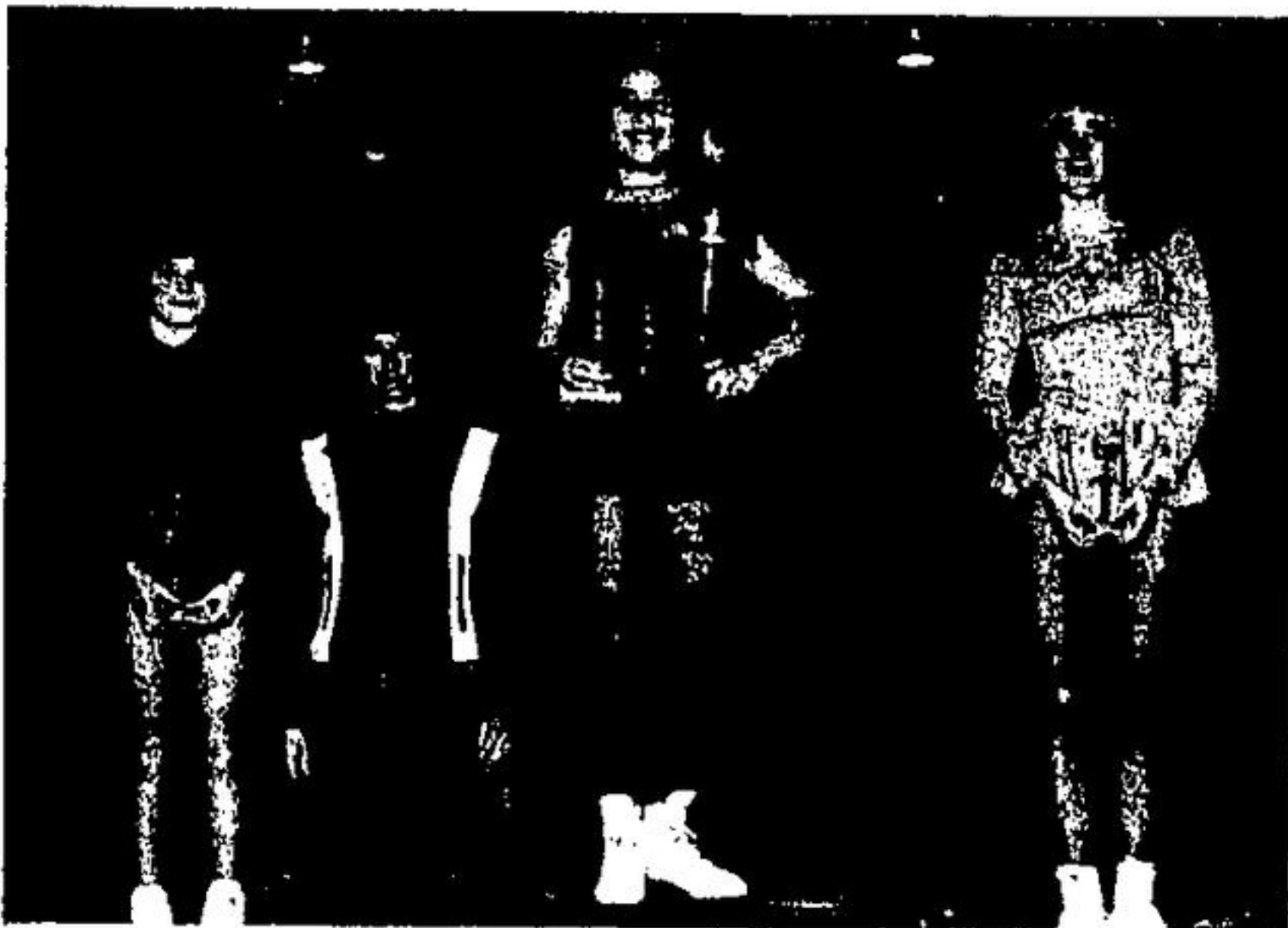


## More winners from figure skating meet

## Ontario Outdoors

American Can of Canada Ltd. has closed and sealed their Marathon Plant. This is the plant where they used mercury to process Chlorine and Caustic Soda. A concrete bunker, which measures 100 feet by 25 feet by 12 feet contains the residue after they removed salvagable material. This bunker had been capped and sealed with high strength concrete and continued monitoring of the site will be carried out by staff from the Ontario Ministry of the Environment. This Ministry also issued six control orders to Abitibi Paper and resulted in a \$44 million pollution abatement program. Since 1960, the Ontario Pulp and Paper industry has spent more than \$120 million on pollution control measures including \$70 million on the removal of the suspended solids and \$12 million on air pollution control.

The bird box workshops are back at the Ministry of Natural Resources in Maple, Ontario. This program is under the direction of the Ministry and sees co-operation with the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters and the Federation of Ontario Naturalists. Both groups are interested in the survival of the small birds in our environment, and these bird boxes encourage and help small flocks of Blue Birds as well as Flickers, Wrens, Wood Ducks and even Screech Owls.

The materials are provided by the Ministry and the labor by the volunteers, and you get to take the boxes home and put them in the best location you can find. The workshops will be held from mid January to the end of February and the exact dates will be released later. The Toronto International Boat Show will be held on January 13 to 22 1978 at the Exhibition Place Toronto. This will prove to be a "one stop show" for the boating industry in Canada. Annually, about 150,000 persons walk through the show, and everything you want to know about boating will be there along with about \$20,000,000 in new boats. That's right, 20 million dollars. The largest boat ever displayed indoors will be there, as the obvious queen of the show. This is the Swede 55 Sailboat designed and built in Stockholm, Sweden. It measures 52 1/2 feet with a beam of 9 feet 7 inches and a draft of only 6 feet 5 inches.
