## Board trustees support controls on pornography

Haltom board of education voted unanimously Thursday in support of more controls on pornography and its exposure to children, but turn down forming a watchdog committee of three trustees to review books and films in the school system.

Mr. Auger, a separate school representative, read the position to the trustees and packed gallery.

"You have to ask for chocolate bars and cigarettes," Mr. Auger said, while "this material is unwittingly displayed to children."

Trustee Elsie Hilson moved that the board set up a committee of herself and trustees H.H. (Bert) Hinton and Ivan Bradley to review books and films for use in the school system and make recommendations on both questionable and desirable material.

## Not lowering lot levies delays seniors housing

Planning board recommended last week that council reduce lot levies to \$885 per unit from \$1,436 for the 52 senior citizens units scheduled to be built in Acton.

Mrs. Hale reminded the board that a similar reduction had been granted to the 89 senior citizens apartments presently under construction in Georgetown and pointed out that the incentive grant would offset the loss of levies to some degree.

The levies in 1976 were \$550. Now they are \$1,436. The town's share of this sum is \$638 while the region receives \$80.

The \$885 figure will be split \$585 to Haltom Hills and \$300 to the region.

Christa Hale, co-ordinator of community housing for the ministry of housing told the committee that unless the levies are lowered to the figure named at the time the project was first begun, it would hold up putting the project up for tender and might also effect the ministry of housing's attitude toward the municipal incentive grant which Haltom Hills intends to apply for.

The program works closely with community agencies for referrals of people who need the service. The volunteers use their own cars, although Mrs. Ball uses her bicycle in good weather.

Since the town wants the units built she feels the ministry would expect the town to be willing to subsidize it to some degree. Other municipalities have been willing to reduce levies in similar circumstances she noted.

All school principals in Haltom have been asked to make sure the board's stand is known by all the teachers and any parent advisory group or community group associated with their schools.

She said the group of trustees had screened about "30 to 40 films," and found some to be "objectionable". What books and films children in the school system are exposed to should be board approved, she charged, "But how many have?"

## Nominate now for citizen

Nominations for Georgetown Citizen of the Year will be received until Dec. 31.

Citizen of the Year chairman Ernie Sykes will receive the awards nominations; then the recipient will be named early into the new year and presented with an award at a special dinner-dance held Feb. 24.

Another departure from past awards ceremonies will see friends and family of the recipients joining the Lions Club and dignitaries for the formal presentation.

Previous Citizens of the Year for Georgetown included Peggy Treahy, 1973; Georgetown Volunteer Firefighters 1974; Rev. Peter Barrow, 1975; Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service 1976; and Connie Nieuwhoff, 1977.
